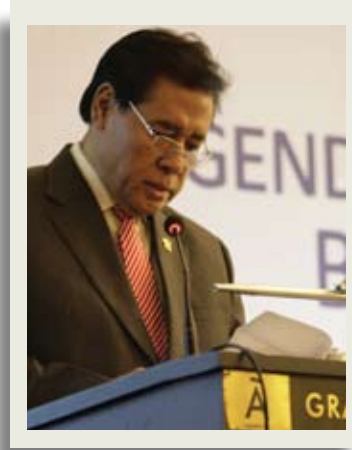

Strong Democracy for a Better Indonesia



Indonesia successfully held general and presidential elections in 2009. The president and vice president-elect have a strong power-base upon which to run the government because they won on only the first round of the elections. They earned more than 50% of the mass vote. Moreover, the Democratic Party, the political party that supported Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono-Boediono (SBY-Boediono), in the previous election also had the highest vote. Thus, there is no reason for SBY-Boediono to be skeptical in running the government.

As the ruling party, the Democratic Party with the coalition parties (Golkar, PKS, PPP, PKB and PAN) must support president SBY and the cabinet to build a better democracy and human rights in Indonesia. As we know, Indonesia is now facing the great challenge of improving the quality of life of those Indonesians in need such as through: increasing people's welfare, reducing the poverty rate, providing job opportunities, lowering prices of basic goods, eradicating corruption, improving the quality of education, etc. These are not simple tasks. To achieve them, Indonesia needs strong leadership and a strong government.

Reflection and Perspective 2008 REFLECTIONS AND PERSPECTIVES 2009

January 13, 2009, The Habibie Center



To start off 2009, The Habibie Center (THC) held a discussion on the 2008 Reflections and Perspectives 2009 with the topic “Elections in the Midst of Crisis: What Kind of Leaders Will We Choose? “. Speakers at this event were Ahmad Watik Pratiknya (THC), Dewi Fortuna Anwar (THC) and Umar Juoro (THC) with R. Siti Zuhro (THC) as moderator.

The highlighted phenomena in the 2008 were the elections in Indonesia and the global economic crisis. Indonesia still undergoes a democratic transition and is facing many internal and external crises where it requires strong, competent leaders who are able to resolve the complexity of problems facing the nation.

This discussion was an opportunity to discuss the election of a leader who can overcome the impact of the global crisis and to improve the national economy. The speakers offered a concept of leadership criteria, among others: decisive, capable, have integrity and have high acceptability in the community.

Participants of the discussion were from among journalists, academics, NGO activists, students and other interest groups.

Chat Roundtable Discussion: ‘Public’s Understanding and Expectations of Women Leaders Candidates’

February 3, 2009, The Habibie Center

As a preliminary workshop on Women Legislative Candidates, The Habibie Center in cooperation with the Hanns Seidel Foundation held a Roundtable Discussion on the topic “Public’s Understanding and Expectations of Women Leader Candidates”.

This discussion focused on the agenda of women’s empowerment, especially in the political field. The speakers in the discussion expected women’s increasing involvement (both in terms of quantity and quality) in the political decision-making in state institutions such as the parliament, the DPD RI and in government in general.

Trigger speakers in the discussion were Sri Budi Eko Wardhani (UI), Ani Sucipto (UI), Maria Hartiningsih (KOMPAS) and Educate Suprianto (JPPR). Discussions were moderated by Lilis Mulyani (THC). The participants in the discussion also included Sulasikin Moerpratomo (THC), Dewi Fortuna Anwar (THC), R. Siti Zuhro (THC), Nursanita Nasution (MCC), Marwah Daud Ibrahim (DPR RI) and Masruchah (KPI).



Workshop “Strategic Step Towards Women Candidates for the Legislative Chair of Parliament 2009-2014”

February 17-18, 2009, Novotel, Bogor



The Habibie Center in cooperation with the Hanns Seidel Foundation held a Workshop on Women’s Legislative Candidates with the theme “ Strategic Step Towards Women Candidates for the Legislative Chair of Parliament 2009-2014”.

The event was aimed: to provide insight to prospective members about the substance of the legislative representation of women in elections; to provide training to prospective members about the potential of women and a political strategy to gain mass support and votes; and to provide training on the duties of legislative members (legislation, budgeting and monitoring) after they are elected as members of the legislature.

About 36 potential women legislative candidates consisting of members of the House of Representatives, Parliament DPD RI and at provincial levels participated in the workshop.

The material presented in the activities included: Women’s Strategies for Winning Legislative Candidates ; Effective Campaign Strategy; Building Women’s Legislative Candidate Image and Voting Calculation Procedures and Determining Elected Candidates.

The speakers for the two-day event were , among others, Sri Budi Eko Wardani (UI), Nursanita Nasution (DPR RI), Putra Siregar (TPI) and Sumarno (KPU Jawa).

Discussion “Caucus for the Consolidation of Democracy: A Critical Evaluation on the Legislative Elections”

April 27, 2009, LIPI, Jakarta



In general, the legislative elections that were held in 2009 went safely and smoothly, however, the quality with which they were implemented was far below expectations. Many problems surfaced and many people, mainly the general public and the political parties that participated in the elections questioned the process of elections. The most frequently addressed issues were the permanent voter list (DPT issue) and the mixed-up ballots in some places. From these issues, a “Caucus for the Consolidation of Democracy”, which consisted of the Political Research Center of the Indonesian Institute of Sciences (P2P-LIPI), Department of Political Science, University of Indonesia (UI) and The Habibie Center (THC), held a discussion with the theme “Critical Evaluation of the Organization of Legislative Elections and Its Solutions” on April 27, 2009 at the LIPI Widya Graha Building in Jakarta.

The caucus included speakers Prof. Dr. Maswadi Rauf (UI), Prof. Dr. Haris Shamsuddin (LIPI), Drs. Andrinof Chaniago, MSI (THC), Dr J. Kristiadi (CSIS), and was moderated by Prof. Dr. Dewi Fortuna Anwar (THC), and focused on coming up with solutions needed in order to “fix” the system and the organization of the elections. There were many legislative election issues that could hinder the development of democracy that needed solutions to the national political constellation after the 2009 General Elections and to be compatible with the democratic consolidation efforts. Some solutions were offered in this discussion, including that the election law needed to comply with the international election standards to provide a legal framework that was fair and democratic, and also to guarantee

citizens' right to vote, so it could be the basis of a relatively permanent law; the need for a recruitment and evaluation system for the selection of the election commission; and the need to determine the DPT list, ideally carried out six months before the election as a reference for the planning logistics for the elections. Moreover, the presidential election of July 2009 should be carefully monitored so that in the future a better quality of presidential election - more legitimate (legal) and credible - could be realized. Coalitions should not be merely a power-oriented entity but should also strengthen and create more effective presidential systems.

Focus Group Discussion “Strategic Agenda

Women Legislative 2009-2014

July 16, 2009, The Habibie Center

The Habibie Center in cooperation with the Hanns Seidel Foundation held a Focus Group Discussion (FGD) with the theme “Strategic Agenda 2009-2014 Member of the Women Legislative “. The event was held as one of the preliminary activities of the Legislative Capacity Building Workshop for Women which was intended to actualize the increased role of women in the legislative for the 2009-2014 period.

The purpose of this event was to refine the issues and consider a strategic agenda to be recommended for women legislators elected at the 2009 general elections. The event invited four speakers, namely Ani Sutripto (UI), Masruchah (KPI), R. Siti Zuhro (THC) and Nursanita Nasution (MCC).

The event was attended by participants from NGO's in women's issues, the Ministry of Women's Empowerment, Women Members/Former Members of Parliament, and other political observers. Among those were Irlang Yuda (GPSP), Angelina Sondakh (Democratic Party), Mudjiati (KNPP), Adinda Tenriangke Muchtar (The Indonesian Institute), and Aida Vitayala (IPB).

“President-Elect’s Bureaucracy Reform Agenda and Good Governance”

July 21, 2009, The Habibie Center

Bureaucratic reform and good governance systems are two very important aspects in ensuring government processes and public services that are transparent, quick, convenient and inexpensive. In Indonesia, there are many problems within the bureaucracy, which mainly account for the poor performances, therefore, reform in the bureaucratic entity and the implementation of good governance that is integrated, comprehensive and holistic is imperative.

The Habibie Center held a Chat Session (light discussion) with the theme the “Bureaucracy Reform Agenda and Good Governance” on Tuesday, July 21, 2009. It was organized in order to understand to what degree the president and vice president-elect have partisanship and commitment to implementing bureaucratic reform and good governance.

The chat was expected to produce a clearer picture of to what extent the bureaucracy reform and good governance programs had been included in the president and vice president-elect's vision and mission and program. The vision and mission was then criticized by the participants, who had academic, research institutions and NGOs backgrounds. Speakers at the event were Prof. Dr. Sofian Effendi (UGM), DR. R. Siti Zuhro, MA (THC), and Prof. Dr. Eko Prasjo (UI). The speaker for the SBY-Boediono success team, who originally planned to attend, could not participate in the end because of a clash with the National Coordination Meeting of the Democratic Party. Participants who attended were very diverse, ranging from former ministers, a former ambassador, researchers, academics, journalists, NGO activists and students.



Workshop "Toward Solidity, Credibility, and Professionalism of Women in the Legislative 2009-2014 Period"

August 12-14 2009, The Habibie Center



As part of The Habibie Center program to support the representation of women in legislative institutions, THC, in collaboration with Hanns Seidel Foundation, held a workshop for elected women Members of the Legislative with the theme "Towards a Solidity, Credibility, and Professionalism of Women in the Legislative Period 2009-2014". This workshop was a continuation of the cooperation undertaken by both institutions in February 2009, the workshop for Prospective Women Members of the Legislative. The two-day workshop (12-13 August 2009) at Hotel Novotel Bogor, aimed to improve the understanding of elected women legislators about their existence in the legislative institution and their role in improving justice and public welfare. The Habibie Center encourages more women to participate in the public sphere, including in the parliament, as well as increase the capacity of women who have been elected to parliament.

The workshop was attended by 22 members of the legislature, House of Representatives, Provincial DPRD, Regency/City and the DPD. They came from different political parties and electoral districts.

Speakers at the workshop were Ahmad Watik Pratiknya (THC), R. Siti Zuhro (THC), Topo Santoso (UI), Sri Eko Budi Wardhani (UI) and Elprisdat (National Press Club Indonesia). The issues discussed included: Reality and Hope: House of Representatives 2009-2014; Strategic Issues for Women in Parliament 2009-2014; Definitions, Practices, and Handling of Corruption; and the Importance of Inter-Network Legislative External Parties.

Discussion Ministry of Women Empowerment in the Cabinet, 2009-2014

September 16, 2009, The Habibie Center



To respond to the issues about the possible abolition of the ministry of women in the cabinet of Indonesian 2009-2014 in the media, the Strategic Development Division, Women's Rights Fulfillment, The Habibie Center held a discussion on the theme 'Women Empowerment in the Ministry of Cabinet 2009-2014'.

This discussion looked at proposals to maintain the presence of women in cabinet ministries. The event was attended by several prominent women figures, including Saparinah Sadli, Moeryati Soedibyo, Linda Gumelar, and Aida Vitayala.

The discussion was hosted by Soelasikin Moerpratomo and Aisyah Amini and focussed on the role of women in developing countries. The goal was to encourage the equality of women's authority in all fields and positions, not only to empower women but to create partnerships that were fair, equal, and sincere. It was hoped that the synergies in what was finally implemented were optimal so that the welfare of the people can be improved.

Commemoration of the 10th Anniversary of The Habibie Center

November 10-11, 2009, Gran Melia, Jakarta

In its 10th Anniversary Commemoration, The Habibie Center held a series of activities for two days of 10-11 November 2009 at the Hotel Gran Melia Kuningan Jakarta with the theme “Strengthening the Consolidation of Democracy and Ending the Transitional Period: 2009-2014 National Agenda”. The series of 10th Anniversary Commemoration activities consisted of (1) A series of discussions, or chats, as they were called, on politics, economics, law, human rights, and information technology, (2) An Exhibition, (3) Interschool Debating Championship (in English), (4) Performing Arts, (5) Scholarship Recipients Presentation and Habibie Award, and (6) 10th Anniversary Commemoration dinner and awarding of the Habibie Award.

The discussion on the political scene dealt with the “Strategic Political Agenda of the New Government”. The speakers were: Sofian Effendy (THC/UGM); Anas Urbaningrum (Democratic Party); A. Sulastikin Moerpratomo (THC); J. Kristiadi (CSIS); and R. Siti Zuhro (THC/LIPI).

The topic “Commitment and Agenda of Fighting Corruption in the Executive, Judiciary, and Legislature” was discussed by a panel of Prof. Dr Muladi (THC); Bambang Widjojanto (ICW Ethics Board); Gayus Lumbun (DPR/RI); and Artidjo Alkostar (MA).

The topic “Role of Information Technology in Accelerating and Improving the Quality of Democracy” was discussed by IT experts, among others: Ilham Akbar Habibie (THC/IG-ADD); Halim Sulasmono (IT VP PT. Telkom); Marwah Daud Ibrahim (THC); and Ninok Leksono (Kompas Cyber Media).

On economics, the topic was “Accelerating the Realization of Energy Security and Economic Independence” and was discussed by: Saswinadi Sasmodjo (ITB); Evita Legowo (Director General of Oil and Gas); Aviliani (INDEF); and Kurtubi (Energy Specialist).

The regional “ASEAN Intergovernmental Commission on Human Rights (AICHR): Prospects and Challenges” was discussed by Dewi Fortuna Anwar (THC/LIPI); Rafendi Djamin (HRWG); and Djauhari Oratmangun (Director General for ASEAN Affairs, Deplu). In addition to holding a national seminar, The Habibie Center also held an international forum entitled “Democracy as a Regional Strategic Agenda” with keynote speakers Paul Wolfowitz (U.S.) Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim (Malaysia); Heinrich Seemann (Germany); Niu Tiehong (China); June Honna (Japan) and Bridget Welsh (U.S.).

The Habibie Center also held a performing arts show with the theme “The Journey of Reflection in Art” which show-





cased Taufiq Ismail, Sun Studios and Deavies Sanggar Matahari, and Sujiwo Tejo. On the same night, a book by Junus E. Habibie "Journey to the Son" ["Perjalanan Putera Labukkang Parepare menuju Koninklijke Huis van Oranje, Paleis Noordeinde"], was launched. On the next day, an intervarsity debating competition in the English language was also held. Qualifying sessions were held at The Habibie Center a few days earlier. Exhibition displays, 10 years of THC activity, as well as human resources and Orbit Foundation and Foundation for Human Resources in Science and Technology (SDM IPTEK). In addition, several agencies participated in the exhibition: Bank Muammalat; Lippo Group (educational institutions); CSIS; USINDO; Bank Mata; BRI; Hukum Online; and RSPP (Rumah Sakit Pusat Pertamina); Agung Podomoro Group, and Polytron.



As the commemorations of the 10th anniversary reached its climax, the THC awards were given to the 2009 THC Habibie Award winners, which were attended by Vice President, Prof. Dr. Boediono on November 11, 2009. The Vice President delivered the main speech of the night.



Local Democracy Research Part III

Democracy and Local Political Culture: Formulating Democracy Models in Four Localities

January - December, 2009

The Habibie Center research, based on a sample of four localities, found that differences in the concepts and practices of democracy in Indonesia are directly related to the wealth of the country's political and cultural values. These characteristics, the research showed, were influenced by at least three different elements, they were: the local political culture; the role of local actors in democracy; and community perceptions of democratic values. The research was aimed at formulating democracy models and to gain knowledge of the political institutions in a broad cross-section of localities in Indonesia.

The research was a continuation of two previous The Habibie Center local democracy studies, namely, 'Change and Continuity of Local Political Culture Values' and the 'Role of Actors in Promoting and Inhibiting Democratization'. As in previous years, The Habibie Center cooperated with the TIFA Foundation.

The research team was Dr R. Siti Zuhro (THC, the head of the research team), Eko Prasajo (Universitas Indonesia), Tommy Legowo (FORMAPPI) and Wenny Pahlemy (THC). The methods of research were field and library research using interview, Focus Group Discussion (FDG) and document study. In addition, the study was discussed further

with experts in workshops both before and after the fieldwork. The experts invited to the workshops were Arie Sudjito, Ibn Tricahyo, Ryaas Rashid, Maswadi Rauf and Laode Ida.

The research locations were the same as for previous research, namely, East Java (Surabaya and Malang), West Sumatra (Padang and Bukittinggi), South Sulawesi (Parepare and Enrekang) and Bali (Denpasar and Bedugul). Indicators in the research were values of the local political culture; the lives of women; the community's pragmatism and opportunism attitude; actors' roles; and the dynamics of political/democracy institutions in the region (political parties, parliaments, NGOs, CSOs and the bureaucracy).

The research concluded that the model of local democracy in East Java had a tendency to adopt a "constructive functional institutional model", while West Sumatra showed a tendency to adopt a "constructive dysfunctional institutional model", as for South Sulawesi, it had an inclination to adopt a "nondemocratic functional model", and Bali had an inclination to adopt a "dysfunctional nondemocratic model".

Discussion “Use of the Alternative Energy Biometanol in Indonesia”

March 31, 2009, The Habibie Center



On March 31, 2009, The Habibie Center the Institute for Democratization of Science and Technology (IDST) held a discussion by a panel of experts on the theme “Use of the Alternative Energy Biometanol in Indonesia”. The discussion showed the real concern that The Habibie Center has for environmental issues, particularly regarding climate change.

Dr. Yetti Rusli (Expert Staff from the Ministry of Forestry) in her presentation revealed problems with the forests, especially forests in Indonesia. Nanang Roffandi Ahmad (chairman of the Association of Indonesian Forest Concessionaires) emphasized the huge potential of Indonesia’s forests in reducing the impact of climate change. Furthermore, Asep Suntana showed evidence of the steady depletion of fossil fuel production. Dr.-Ing. Ilham A. Habibie (IDST Chairman) mentioned that Indonesia was in a unique position in this matter.

Those who participated in the discussion included Prof. Suminar Setiati, Prof. Kamaruddin Abdullah (Darma Persada University Rector), Dr. Agus Eko Tjahjono (BPPT), Dr. Bambang Prasetya (LIPI), Agung Nugroho (PT. Ilthabi Rekatama), Dr. Fuadi Rasyid (The Habibie Center), and Ninok Leksono as moderator.

Discussion “The Establishment of an Ombudsman Institution”

November 4, 2009, Atlet Century Hotel



On November 4th, 2009, the Asia-Europe Foundation (ASEF) in collaboration with the Habibie Center (THC) and the Hanns Seidel Foundation (HSF) held a discussion on “The Establishment of an Ombudsman Institution” at Atlet Century Hotel in Jakarta with speakers, Prof. Dr. Roel Fernhout, former Ombudsman of the Netherlands, Dr. Mohammad Fajrul Falaakh, a law expert from Gajah Mada University and Prof. Dr. C.F.G. Sunaryati Hartono, SH, Deputy Chairman, Ombudsman, Indonesia.

As part of ASEF’s Asia-Europe program 5 cities tour - Jakarta, Phnom Penh, Vientiane, Hanoi and Ulan Bator, Prof. Dr. Roel Fernhout addressed the general characteristics of ombudsmanship as well as challenges that need to be overcome in setting up a new ombudsman institution or improving an existing one.

The Asia-Europe Foundation was mandated by the Asia-Europe Meeting (ASEM I) to promote better mutual understanding and closer cooperation between the people of Asia and Europe through greater intellectual, cultural, and people-to-people exchanges. These exchanges include conferences, lecture tours, workshops, seminars and the use of web-based platforms. ASEF works in partnership with other public institutions and civil society actors to facilitate and encourage dialogue on issues of common concern. This particular Lecture Tour was organized under the Asia-Europe Democratization and Justice Series which provides a platform for Asia-Europe exchanges in the field of democratization and justice through dialogue between civil society and policymakers, with a particular focus on transitional countries.

Seminar “Constitutional Law and Election”

November 17, 2009, The Habibie Center



The Habibie Center in collaboration with the Hanns Seidel Foundation held a seminar with the theme “Constitutional Law and Elections”, which was held on 17 November 2009 at The Habibie Center Building. Guest speaker was Dr. Siegfried Bross, a German Constitutional Court Judge, and as a commentator, Prof. Dr. Jimly Asshidiqie, SH, former Chairman of the Constitutional Court and it was moderated by Lilis Mulyani, LLM (THC).

Dr. Siegfried Bross delivered a speech entitled “The Basic of Constitutional Law on Election Processes” in which he discussed the German constitutional law as a legal basis for elections. Dr. Bross also made a comparative analysis of, among others, the fundamentals in the German constitutional law compared with the Indonesian constitutional law and of the election practices in the respective countries.

Prof. Dr. Jimly Asshidiqie, SH at the seminar as one of the key figures in Indonesia’s Constitutional Court explained the role of the Constitutional Court in the election process and described similarities and differences in the constitutional law of both countries. Among the participants at the seminar were members of the House of Representatives, government agencies, the press, legal institutions and NGOs.

This event was one of a series of engagements on Dr. Bross’s tour of three major cities in Indonesia, namely Jakarta, Palembang and Yogyakarta in conjunction with study visits and knowledge sharing among academicians, government agencies and NGOs. Dr. Siegfried Bross, in addition to being a Judge of the Constitutional Court of Germany, is also a professor at the University of Freiburg, Breisgau and Honorary Chairman of the Presidium of the German Section of the International Law Commission of Experts. In 2009, he earned his Honorary Doctorate from the University Islam Indonesia, Yogyakarta.

International Executive Forum China and ASEAN Facing the Global Economic Crisis

March 5, 2009, The Habibie Center



The impact of the global economic crisis in 2008 was felt in some Asian countries, including China and ASEAN countries. Although the effects were not very serious, there was an apparent need to put up a good strategy in the financial sector and real sector.

As a country with high economic growth during the last ten years and the third largest in GDP in the world, ASEAN invited China to conduct a joint agenda in the context of restructuring the financial sector, as well as improving trade and regional investment in China-ASEAN.

Present as speakers in this discussion were HE Madam Zhang Qiyue (Ambassador of the PRC in Indonesia) and Syamsul Hadi (Universitas Indonesia) as responder. Moderator of the discussion was Dewi Fortuna Anwar (THC).

Participants came from various backgrounds that made the discussion more stimulating given the coming ASEAN-China Free Trade Agreement.

Public Lecture China Defense Report 2009

April 21, 2009, The Habibie Center



This forum discussed the United States Department of Defense report to the U.S. Congress on China's defense white paper for 2009 on the progress in China's weaponry. From the report statistics, it was noted that China had again increased the country's budget for defense and security.

This was manifested through increased spending on defense systems such as weapons, aircraft, warships, tanks and other military needs.

Public Lecture
“Socialization of Science and Technology
in the Islamic Republic of Iran:
Improving Access to Gain Social Justice”

April 21, 2009, The Habibie Center



As a country with rapid science and technology growth, especially in the nuclear field, Iran is a good example of a country that can develop science and technology for humanitarian purposes. This international executive forum invited a speaker from the Automotive Engineering Department & Research Center, Prof. M.H. Shojaee Fard. He is also president of the Iranian Society of Automotive Engineers.

Prof. Fard promoted success in education, technology, automotive, food, energy and agriculture in Iran. Participants who attended were a very diverse group ranging from academics, observers of foreign relations, mass media, NGO activists, students and representatives of embassies in Jakarta.

International Executive Forum
“Turkey Between Middle East and
Europe: Promoting Peace
and Stability”

June 18, 2009, The Habibie Center

His Excellency Aydin Evirgen, the Ambassador of Turkey to Indonesia, was the speaker at the International Executive Forum on ‘Turkey Between Middle East and Europe: Promoting Peace and Stability’ on 18 June 2009. The forum was hosted by The Habibie Center and also featured two discussants, Marina Estella Anwar Bey (Department of Foreign Affairs) and Dr. Ahmad Ramzi Tadjudin (University of Indonesia).

Ambassador Evirgen gave a presentation on the complex issue of Turkey’s development and integration into the European community. Although 97% of the country’s territory is technically located in Asia, Turkish people consider themselves part of Europe. Moreover, 98% of the population are Muslims, yet Turkey remains secular by choice since religious and cultural development has progressed for several years now and Turkey has begun to cherish European values. Despite the tensions and complications that have surfaced, Turkey will maintain its orientation towards Europe and strive to become a civilization that will eventually be acknowledged and rewarded with EU membership. The ensuing discussion focused on many aspects surrounding Turkey and its relations with the EU. Speakers and discussants highlighted the country’s disadvantages as well as advantages when looking at its potential as a fully integrated EU member state.

International Executive Forum “African and Libyan Policy in the Global Political and Economy: Constellation”

July 29, 2009, Four Seasons Hotel, Jakarta

The Habibie Center, in cooperation with the Embassy of Libya, held a discussion on the topic “African and Libyan Policy in the Global Political and Economic Constellations” on Wednesday, July 29, 2009 at the Four Seasons Hotel, Jakarta.

The discussion was moderated by Rahimah Abdulrahim, Program Manager of The Habibie Center, and the speakers were, namely, HE Muhammed Ahmed Sharif as a state representative from Libya and TM Hamzah Thayeb (Director General for Asia-Pacific and Africa, Ministry of Foreign Affairs Republic of Indonesia).

Discussions that lasted for about 2 hours covered the issues of the peace and prosperity of African countries and the importance of cooperation between countries that are developing such as Indonesia and Libya respectively, representing themselves as Asian and African countries. The event was attended by several dignitaries - among others, the Ambassador of Egypt, Ahmed el-Kewaisny; Ambassador to Sudan, Ibrahim Bushra; Ambassador to Morocco, Muhammed Najdi; Ambassador to Lebanon, Victor Zmeter; Ambassador to Sri Lanka, Nanda Mallawaraacchi; Council of Ulama of Nigeria, Sheikh Ibrahim Sholeh; Mahmud Hussein Reeh, Libya; Ms. Hj. Tutty Alawiyah, as Director LPIL (Institute for Friendship Indonesia-Libya Institution), and Dr. Ahmad Watik Pratiknya as Executive Director of The Habibie Center.



International Roundtable Discussion “Towards Better Relations between Korea and ASEAN Countries: An Interdisciplinary Perspective”

August 11, 2009, The Habibie Center



This International Roundtable Discussion between The Habibie Center and the Hankuk University of Foreign Studies, of Seoul, South Korea, on August 11, 2009 was expected to be a starting point to establish cooperation between the two institutions and especially with Korean citizens in Indonesia. The event was divided into two sessions, the seminar participants gave presentations on various topics, including on political, economic, social, cultural, and humanitarian issues.

The Hankuk University of Foreign Studies is one of the leading private universities in South Korea and is an acknowledged leader in its country in the areas of foreign languages, international affairs/diplomacy, and foreign and regional studies.

Participants who attended were, among others, representatives from the Hankuk University of Foreign Studies, representatives of The Habibie Center, Dewi Fortuna Anwar and Dr. Zamroni Salim, a representative of the Australian National University Dr. Max M. Richter, Prof. Dr. Ding Choo Ming from Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia and Prof. Aiko Kurasawa from Keio University, Japan. Also attending were representatives from the different ASEAN members,

representatives from Embassies and from the Permanent Mission to ASEAN. Some of the presentations discussed in this seminar were: Cross-National Stock Market Analysis; East Asian Economic Integration; The Role of Indonesia in Inter-Korea Relations; Issues and Problems in the 20th Century's Malaysian History; Compliment Responses among Indonesians and Koreans.

At the end of the seminar, The Habibie Center and Hankuk University of Foreign Studies signed an MoU whereby they agreed to enter into an MoU for research exchange, and to strengthen and expand relations between the two institutions, especially in the area of research.

Dialogue Indonesia-Taiwan Dialogue

December 6-8, 2009, Lido Lakes, Sukabumi

The Habibie Center in collaboration with the Taipei Economic and Trade Office (TETO) held an Indonesia-Taiwan Dialogue at Lido Lakes Resort & Conference, Sukabumi, Bogor, on 6-8 December 2009. The event was attended by 23 delegates from Taiwan and 25 delegates from Indonesia. Participants in the dialogue came from various backgrounds including the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Taiwan, local government, political parties, university, media, NGOs and research institutions. The discussed issues were politics, economy, non-traditional security, and social and cultural exchanges between the two countries.

The dialogue was intended to establish more intensive communication and closer relations between the two countries. Although Indonesia does not have diplomatic ties with Taiwan, since Indonesia's foreign policy adopts a one-China policy, it is expected that Indonesia

will not be too rigid in interpreting the policy. Taiwan as the third country of the 'Asian Tigers' (after Japan and Singapore) is an economic and trade partner that is of strategic importance for Indonesia.

At the end of the dialogue on December 8, 2009, both parties agreed on several commitments, these were: enhancing mutual understanding and cooperation in the future in education (research and providing scholarships) as well as youth exchange programs and by journalists.

This dialogue was the second such dialogue organized by The Habibie Center in cooperation with TETO. The first dialogue was held in 2007 with a focus on prospective young leaders.

Book Launch “Last Cabinet Meeting of the New Order: 12 Hours Prior to President Suharto’s Resignation”

January 29, 2009, The Habibie Center



This book contains interviews with the Seventh Development Cabinet Ministers at a meeting of 14 ministers in the office of the Coordinating Ministry of Economy, Finance and Industry. The outcome of the meeting was a letter to President Soeharto declaring their unwillingness to associate with President Soeharto’s Reform Cabinet as the solution to the crisis at that time.

In addition, the book, by Andi Makmur Makka and published by Republika, also told about the ministers’ meeting at the residence of Vice President BJ Habibie on May 20, 1998. The book reveals both the mystery on-screen resignation of President Soeharto.

Speakers in the review of the book were Theo L. Sambuaga (Minister of Manpower Development, Cabinet VII), Fachry Ali (Observer Politics Universitas Indonesia), Julius Pour (Bentara Budaya, Compass), A. Malik Fadjar (The Habibie Center). Ikhwanul Kiram Mashuri (Editor-in-chief, Republika) was the moderator.

Discussion “Pluralism Issues in Media Perspective”

March 25, 2009, The Habibie Center

A workshop on a research called Pluralism Issues in Media Perspective was held to get suggestions, criticism and input from experts to improve the library/bibliography of the research conducted by The Habibie Center research team, they are: Sumarno, Afdal Makkuraga, Wenny Pahlmemy and Ian Suherlan.

The research, which was a conjoint effort by The Habibie Center and the TIFA Foundation, discussed the pluralism

issue of the media in the five top media in the nation, namely KOMPAS, Media Indonesia, Republika, TEMPO and GATRA. The cases reviewed were the Pornography Bill and the Monas incident on June 1, 2008.

Speakers at the workshop were A. Makmur Makka (THC), Eryanto (LSI), Idi Isbandi Ibrahim (LSPP) and Renata Arianingtyas (TIFA). The speakers gave some insights and inputs about the process and determinants of editorial coverage. Internal factors included platform, orientation, and



editorial policy. External factors included media ethics, the principles of democracy, as well as political and economic considerations.

“Local Democracy: Cultural Values and the Role of Political Actors in Democratization”

April 1, 2009, The Occasion, Dharmawangsa Square, Jakarta



The book “Local Democracy: Cultural Values and the Role of Political Actors in Democratization” was produced through a series of research conducted by The Habibie Center during the 2007-2008 period in four areas including East Java, West Sumatra, South Sulawesi, and Bali.

Principal investigator of The Habibie Center, Dr. R. Siti Zuhro, gave a presentation about the research, followed by the delivery of a speech by Bacharuddin Jusuf Habibi.

bie. This book is very interesting, since the results in the four areas of the research study shows that these different areas have distinct political and cultural values that have played significant roles in encouraging democracy, both in terms of public participation, the realization of good governance, elections, legislative elections, political parties and freedom of the press, although they have also discovered some values that impede the process of democratization.

The studies on the role of local political actors in the four areas focused on activities and participation in the electoral process and in the budget-making process. The results of this study indicate that these actors are less likely to reflect the aspirations, interests, and desires of local communities.

Furthermore, B. J. Habibie in a speech entitled "The Direction of Post-Election Democratic Consolidation 2009" presented a view of achieving the democratization process including political parties, representative institutions, and elections. B.J. Habibie explained his views on how to develop the quality and performance of these institutions in order to improve the consolidation of democracy. In terms of leadership, B.J. Habibie gave his views on leadership issues facing the nation today and what strategies need to be considered by the people to choose the future leader coinciding with the end of the transitional period.

Book Launch "Pluralism Issues in Media Perspective"

June 25, 2009, The Habibie Center



Pluralism is often a controversial issue in Indonesian society. Similar to the public, the media are also polarized into the two poles of the pros and cons. Through the case of Ahmadiyah and the Pornography Bill, this book among others has tried to see it against the backdrop of the economic and political backgrounds of the various media in addressing both these issues.

Sumarno as coordinator of the research team explained the outline of the book. Discussants of this book review were Prof. Ibn Hamad (UI) and Andi Makmur Makka (former chief editor, Republika). The discussants gave inputs about the mechanisms and strategies in several news media. In practice, the objectivity of journalists still needs to be harmonized with the subjectivity of the editor and company policy.

Book Review "Heidegger for Muslims"

The book consists of two writings of two philosophers of modernism, namely Abdalhaqq Bewley of England and Umar I. Vadillo from Spain. Both are European Muslims that includes a non-modernist stream. According to them, modernity has ended. They warned that Islamic modernism was not only not a solution for Muslims, but also the road to bankruptcy for the people themselves.

Discussion

"Goethe's Perspective on Islam and Money and its Influence on the Usage of Gold Dinar and Silver Dirham in Indonesia"

September 4, 2009, The Habibie Center



As a philosopher and one of the greatest German poets, Goethe is worthy to be studied. After the discovery of several manuscripts of Goethe about Islam and paper money, many questions arose for the historian about Goethe's Muslim status. From a literature review, it was found that Goethe was a Muslim and supported the implementation of dinars and dirhams as a means of payment that could be resistant to fluctuations in the value of money (revaluation and devaluation).

The impact of Goethe's thinking on the use of dinars and dirhams in Indonesia can be seen from a long series of events since the study by western scholars of Goethe's thinking; such as campaigning for the use of dinars and dirhams by ICMI; the establishment of dinar and dirham exchange agents in Indonesia and their dealings with some agencies using the gold and silver currency.

Speakers at this discussion were Nurman Kholis (MORA RI) and moderator Akhmad Jayadi (THC). This discussion was attended by the media, students, and history observers and of Islam.

“Community Development Efforts and Da’wah: Can the Public’s Economic and Social Rights Be Fulfilled?”

This training was attended by 19 young leaders from four ASEAN countries namely Indonesia, Malaysia, Brunei Darussalam and Singapore. In late December 2009, Prof. Dewi Fortuna Anwar (Director for Program and Research) and Ima Abdulrahim (manager for Program and Communication) took part in a Study Visit on Community Building Experiences in the European Union for the ASEAN Network of Experts organized by InWEnt - Capacity Building International, Germany. The Study Visit was part of a project that aims to contribute to the introduction of a Networked Secretariat concept at the ASEAN Secretariat (ASEC) in Jakarta. The Study Visit was an integral part of the various activities to lead to a sound conceptualization, including analyses of the ASEC's current outreach and links to the ASEAN Member States, in-depth analyses of up to three ASEAN Member States with respect to their institutional links to the ASEC and intensive dialogue on the recommendations for a "Networked ASEAN Secretariat".

The Study Visit was conceived as a dialogue program that included various ASEAN Stakeholders, ASEC Officials and representatives of political and civil society institutions in ASEAN Member States. Together with a team of EU/ASEAN experts and facilitators the participants learned about the outreach experiences of the European Union and discussed possible strategies for ASEAN.

The participants visited and held discussions with a number of relevant European institutions such as: the Enterprise Europe Network (EEN), the European Economic and Social Committee (EESC), the European Institute for Asian Studies (EIAS), the European Peacebuilding Liaison Office (EPLO), Eurocorp, Council of Europe, and Friends of Europe.

Q-Chanel 2009 Taping Analyzing the 2009 Election System: Will it Consolidate Democracy?

March 4, 2009

Indonesia still undergoes democratic transition. The 2009 Elections should have been the vehicle to create a system for a better democracy. This discussion explored the election system in depth to find the gaps and shortcomings that needed to be improved.. The talk show was hosted by Ahmad Watik Pratiknya and election experts Hadar Gumay (CETRO Executive Director) and R. Siti Zuhro (Doctor of Political Science from Flinders University, Adelaide, Australia, and Researcher at P2P LIPI and THC).

Legislative Election Process: Between Hope and Reality

March 11, 2009

The selection of candidates for the legislative elections, and a seat in the House of Representatives, is the most decisive moment for both political parties and the legislative candidates themselves. All parties hope to stage the elections as candidates setting; and that the determination of voters; campaigning; voting; counting of votes and the determination of legislative and the election-winning party runs smoothly and has good quality. All of the above issues were discussed in the talk show hosted by Ahmad Watik Pratiknya with speakers Ray Rangkuti (Civil Circle for Indonesia), Dewi Fortuna Anwar (THC) and Andrinof Chaniago (THC).

The Prospect of Women Representation in Legislative Institutions

March 18, 2009



Consequent upon the Constitutional Court decision on the rule of majority vote in the 2009 elections, some parties, especially among women, did not hold the view of the pessimists that women would be unable to fulfill the 30% women representation in parliament. 30% women representation in the legislature is needed for women to be a strong force for voicing women's issues in Parliament. In addition, women legislators will be able to balance 'masculinity' in the council building. Ahmad Watik Pratiknya hosted the talk show with Dewi Fortuna Anwar (The Habibie Center) and Sri Budi Eko Wardhani (Puskapol Universitas Indonesia) as the speakers.

Analyzing the 2009 Legislative Elections: Between Popularity and Competence

March 25, 2009



The list of legislative candidates chosen by the Election Commission (KPU) for the 2009 elections included the names of several candidates who were celebrities and famous figures in Indonesia. The popularity of their names in the public eye had the potential to attain a greater voice in elections. But it is questionable whether or not their popularity is proportional to their competence in becoming a member of the legislature. Together with Yudi Latif (Reform Institute) and Siti Zuhro (THC) and Ahmad Watik Pratiknya, this issue was thoroughly discussed with the topic 'Analyzing the 2009 Legislative Elections: Between Popularity and Competence'.

Questioning Voters' Rationality to Improve the Parliament Quality

April 1, 2009

In a democratic society, public choice is no longer based on coercion or intervention powers. The community determines their representatives independently and is based on common sense considerations. But beyond that, the rationality of people with low incomes, are still vulnerable to be influenced by money politics from the prospective members of the House. In the end, the rationality of the community is at stake for the quality of the next Parliament. Sumarno (THC) discussed the issue with Indria Samego (THC) and Andrinof Chaniago (UI).

Legislative Profile 2009-2014: Could They Improve the House's Quality and Productivity?

April 22, 2009



In the post legislative elections, the names that will fill the 2009-2014 legislative seats will have been announced. Some of these names will be the old names and some will be new. Questions that arise in the public's mind are their ability to improve the quality and productivity in the Parliament. So far, the House of Representatives has been labeled as one of the most corrupt institutions. The House of Representatives 2009-2014 carries such a heavy mandate. Ani Sucipto (UI) and Siti Zuhro (THC) discussed the issue with the moderator, Dewi Fortuna Anwar (THC).

Initiating a Rational and Effective Coalition

April 29, 2009

Often times, coalition politics is based on political transactions such as a share of seats in the cabinet and in the leadership in the House of Representatives. It is very rare to see post-reform coalition formats that are based on common party ideologies. The coalition only represents the pragmatic interests of the party leadership. Bahtiar Efendi (UIN) and Umar Juoro (THC) discussed the issue with the moderator Ahmad Watik Pratiknya (THC).

Questioning the Coalition Format and the Rational Cabinet Formation

May 6, 2009

Cabinet formation usually depends on the format of the coalition. Often, the minister positions are filled by people who are not capable in the field; they are appointed just because their coalition is indebted to them. People's demands for a balanced cabinet formation between the coalition and professionals have grown. This talk show discussed issues surrounding the coalition and the make-up of the cabinet with Indria Samego (THC) and Siti Zuhro (THC) and a moderator Ahmad Watik Pratiknya (THC).

Questioning Women's Presence in Parliament, Election Results 2009

May 13, 2009

Public opinion has been formed that the performance quality of women in the parliament is lower than men's. However, such an opinion has not been proven true. The 2009 legislative elections in point of fact produced the greatest woman in the history of Indonesian elections. The women's voice should continue to be expressed in parliament since survey results from several institutions show that women are cleaner, in terms of corruption. Women's issues in parliament was discussed in this talk show with speakers Sri Budi Eko Wardhani (UI) and R. Siti Zuhro (THC), and moderator, Sumarno (THC).

Questioning Presidential System of Politic Multiparty Format

May 20, 2009

The applied presidential systems in Indonesia are in a dilemma in the form of multiparty politics. Political forces in parliament could be a deterrent to the president in taking policies forward as head of state and government. Maswadi Rauf (UI) and Andrinof Chaniago (THC) discuss the issue with moderator, Ahmad Watik Pratiknya (THC).

President and Vice President-Elect Main Agenda: Strategic Domestic Economy Issues

May 27, 2009

Economics is the most selling topic in 2009 Indonesia presidential election campaign. Strategic issues set forth in the vision-mission of each candidate. Theme Anatomy of the 2009 Presidential Election Campaign

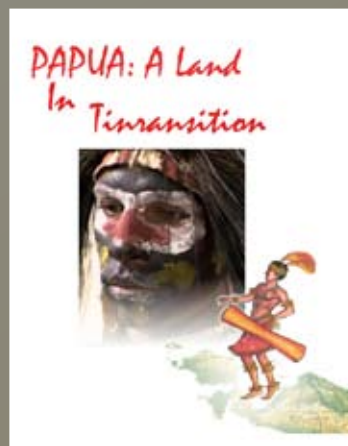
June 24, 2009
