## Advancing Democratization Process in Indonesia



### Roundtable Discussion: “Seeking Consensus on Fossil-Fuel Subsidies”

Hotel Atlet Century, Jakarta  
28 March 2013

Indonesia possesses enviable energy resources, as both a leading exporter of coal and natural gas, and significant potential to expand the role played by renewable energy. But as domestic energy needs grow, it also faces significant challenges in meeting demand. The overarching need is to meet that demand sustainably, in ways that allow Indonesia to meet its climate change commitments, and

without compromising the energy needs of future generations. Energy subsidies loom large in this context, and indeed the role of subsidies in meeting country’s economic, social and environmental objectives have been a focus of intense debate over the years. It is no secret that the rising cost of subsidies is placing a huge burden on limited public resources and presents a fiscal liability, vulnerable to increases in the international price of oil. Current policies are also known to be a highly inefficient tool for reducing poverty and meeting the country’s development needs.

But while the costs of fossil-fuel subsidies “economic, environmental and social” are well known, Indonesians have failed to reach a consensus on a strategy for change (or, indeed, whether reducing fossil-fuel subsidies should even be a priority). In response to the deadlock, this roundtable dialogue gathered a select group of parliamentarians, government officials, civil society and the private sector representatives for a discussion on the competing interests and opinions, with an aim to identifying pathways towards consensus.

The discussion brought in top-level international and local experts to inform the conversation, while also provided a space for individuals from across the political spectrum to share ideas in a relaxed and confidential environment. The discussion was divided into three sessions of 2 hours each. Each session was begun with a brief presentation from the speakers and followed by a discussion and question & answer session.

The dialogue gathered approximately 25 participants from government, NGOs, think-tanks, academicians, organizations and research institutions. In session 1 about ‘Reformation of Fuel Subsidy’, the speakers included Susilo Siswoutomo (Vice Minister of Energy and Mineral Resources) and Arief Budimanta (member of Commission XI of the House of Representatives from PDI-P). In session 2 about ‘Identifying

stakeholders: Interests and positions towards reform’, the speakers included Qoyum Tjandranegara (member of BPH Migas Committee) and Satya Yudha (member of Commission XI of the House of Representatives from Golkar). The last session about ‘Fuel subsidies and the 2014 General Election’, the speakers were Tjatur Sapto Edi (PAN Faction Chairman in House of Representatives) and Burhanuddin Muhtadi (Senior Researcher-Indonesian Survey Institute).

### **Seminar: “E-voting, the Alternative Solutions for Cost-Effective Election Concepts, How Effective?”**

A total of 560 members of the House of Representatives (DPR), who were elected in the 2009 elections, had undergone approximately 2.5 years of service as representatives of the people. During the period, the House did not escape a variety of public scrutiny and criticism. These range from the rise of overseas visits in order to study, the plan to build a new building, repairing the toilets, and renovating the Budget Committee meeting room at a cost of IDR 20.3 billion.

Furthermore, scrutiny, criticism, and public dissatisfaction are also focused on the legislative performance of the House. The yearly target of national legislation program (prolegnas) was

not always optimally achieved. In the national legislation program of 2011, the House targeted 93 legislations to be settled as law. However, the House only managed to complete 24 legislations.

This national seminar was a form of policy research dissemination efforts undertaken by The Habibie Center on “Improving the Legislative Function of the DPR: Recommendations for an Action Plan to Reduce the Backlog of Legislation”. A number of speakers presented in this seminar were Ferry Mursyidan Baldan (Member of Parliament during 2004-2009), Irman Putra Sidin (Constitutional Law Expert), Iberamsjah (Professor of Social Politics, University of Indonesia), and Bawono Kumoro (The Habibie Center Political Researcher).

## Seminar “Political Market and Political Costs, Must it be Expensive?”

On Saturday, April 27, 2013, CIDES-UI and Dompot Dhuafa in collaboration with The Habibie Center held a seminar on elections study with the theme of “Marketing Politik dan Biaya Politik, Haruskah Mahal?” This seminar was part of a series of monthly seminars on election studies that have been conducted since March 2013 by the students of CIDES Campus. At first, the seminar was held in cooperation with UIN and raised the theme of “E-Voting, A Cost-Effective Election Concept, How Effective?” The seminar lasted for half a day from 10:00 to 13:00.

The background of the theme selection was due to the facts that the legislative elections will be held in less than a year and that the registration process for legislative candidate was opened since April 9th 2013. It is known that the capital needed to become members of the legislature is not cheap and the question was whether or not the salary earned could cover the capital used. Some legislators were open about the campaign funds they had spent. Vice Chairman of the House of Representatives, Pramono Anung admitted that he had spent Rp 1.5 billion – Rp 2 billion. While Venna Melinda spent Rp 250 million. According to the results of research by Parliament Watch, to become a legislative candidate for a regency/city’s legislative council require

Rp. 100 million to Rp. 200 million. Candidates running for the provincial legislatures required around 300 million - 500 million, and the costs for House of Representatives candidates were around Rp. 500 million - Rp. 1 Billion.

The questions that the seminar wished to answer was whether political funds saved can affect the economy in the printing and convention business circles, what are the examples of cases that have occurred in relation to candidates who have debts to entrepreneurs, and what the impact of the high cost of politics to the economy and society were.

The Seminar was attended by Mr. M. Arief Purwakananta (Director of Human Resources, Dompot Dhuafa) and Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim (Executive Director, The Habibie Center) as well as Mr. Silih Agung Wasesa (PR Consultant), Mr. Hanta Yudha (LIPI Senior Researcher) and Ms. Annisa Qisthi (CIDES UI Representative). The event was started by presentations from the speakers regarding political marketing and continued with a question and answer session.





## 15 Years of Reformasi for All: Enhancing Migrant Worker Protection in the Globalized Era

On Tuesday 28th May 2013, FISIP UIN Syarif Hidayatullah in collaboration with The Habibie Center held an international seminar on 15 Years of Reformasi for All: Enhancing Migrant Worker Protection in the Globalized Era at Gedung FISIP UIN in Ciputat, Banten. This seminar was held as a part of the @15thnReformasi week.

This Seminar was divided into two sessions. The first session focused on the trends on international migration and the challenges/obstacles that were raised and involved Mr. Ahmad

Badri Ismail (Labor Attache, Embassy of Malaysia), Mr. Hendra Adi (Counter Trafficking and Labor Migration Unit, IOM), Mr. Thaufiek Zulfahary (Counter Trafficking and Labor Migration Unit, IOM) and Dra. Tri Nuke Pujiastuti (Researcher, Indonesian Institute of Sciences, P2P-LIPI). This session was moderated by Dr. Zamroni Salim. From this session, Dr. Zamroni Salim observed that there are many challenges regarding the migration and there has to be solutions for it in the long run and also stressing on how Indonesia views the issues regarding the migrant workers from a humanity perspective.

The seminar continued with a second session on Ensuring 15 Years of Reformasi for All: Improving International, Regional and National

Efforts at Protecting the Rights of Migrant Workers. This second session involved Dr. Servolus (BNP2TKI) and Ms. Iim Halimatusadiah (Lecturer, Department of Sociology, FISIP UIN Syarif Hidayatullah) and was moderated by Ms. Mutiara Pertiwi (Lecturer, Department of International Relations, FISIP UIN Syarif Hidayatullah). The second session not only focused on the procedural aspect of sending and protecting migrant workers but also focused on the social and psychological aspects of children from migrant workers parents. Ms. Mutiara Pertiwi closed the second session by giving recommendations on the importance of the migrant workers family to reunite and to deal with the stateless children that result from unwanted pregnancy.

## 15 Years of Reformasi through Foreign Eyes

On Wednesday, June 4th 2013, The Habibie Center held a talk show on 15 Years of Reformasi through Foreign Eyes. The aim of the talk show was to gather expatriates living in Indonesia who had lived through the Reformasi years in order to hear their unique perspective in Indonesia's democratization process since 1998 and discuss the impact of Reformasi on the political, economic and social-cultural lives of expatriates and those around them. This event was part of the @15thnReformasi week.

The talk show was moderated by Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim (Executive Director, The Habibie Center) and featured Mr. Scott Cunliffe (Search for Common Grounds), Mr. Kevin Evans (UNDP), Dr. Satish Mishra (Strategic Asia), Dr. Douglas Ramage (Bower Group Asia) and Mr. Daniel Ziv (writer and filmmaker of *Jalanan*). The talk show which was to focus on how far Indonesian politics had progressed since Reformasi began with Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim introducing the speakers as those who had spent more than 15 Years in Indonesia and inviting them to tell about their experience, views, achievements and perspective (positive or negative) regarding Indonesia post Reformasi.

After each panelist had spoken, the talk show continued with a question and answer session with Prof. Dr. Dewi Fortuna Anwar commenting on the assumption that Indonesia's Reformasi just took place and that it had simply been a trial and error process. Members of the audience also asked about the state of corruption in Indonesia, the sectors of development as well as the state-recognized religious systems in Indonesia. The talk show which was very thought-provoking given how both panelist and audience engaged themselves in the discussion ended after two hours. Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim ended the talk show by thanking panelist speakers and audience and presented the book *Democracy Take-Off: The BJ Habibie Period* to each speaker as a gift.





## National Seminar “National Insurance in Indonesia: Progress and Challenges”

On Monday, October 21, 2013, The Habibie Center, in collaboration with Hanns Seidel Foundation, held a national seminar on “National Insurance in Indonesia: Progress and Challenges”. This seminar was aimed to give significant input for the government and related institutions about the implementation of National Insurance that is planned to be started by January 2014. The increasing domestic and global economic challenges tend to have economic and social impacts to the society, especially related to the protection of income, health and welfare in general.

Insurance become crucial need when

the people are facing uncertainty in the globalizing world. The Indonesian government has a goal to implement the single institution to serve the overall social insurance for all people. In order to achieve the social goal, the government initiated to establish Social Insurance Body – Badan Penyelenggara Jaminan Sosial (BPJS). Many preparations have been done including the interconnection between the previous insurances providers, legal requirements, budget and public education.

Prior to the seminar, there was a supportive task that was done to write a piece of policy paper on national health insurance in Indonesia. This policy paper was developed through a series of discussion between three resource persons namely Dr. Zamroni Salim (The Habibie Center / Indonesian Institute of Science (LIPI) Senior

Researcher), Drs. Odang Muchtar, MBA, QIP (Pamjaki) and Teguh Dartanto (Institute for Economic and Social Research (LPEM-FEUI)). The policy paper contains information to address following questions on how Indonesia government has managed the people welfare through National Insurance, how government and other institutions related to the National Insurance has prepared for the implementation of National Insurance, stakeholders’ respond to government proposal of National Insurance and the overall preparations of the government to overcome potential political, economic and social problem arising from the implementation of National Insurance.

The national seminar, besides aiming to disseminate the policy paper, was also aimed to gather experts to talk about the progress and challenges of the implementation of national health insurance. The speakers of the seminar were Prof. H. Bambang Purwoko, SE, MA, PhD (Guru Besar Ekonomika Jaminan Sosial dan Manajemen Resiko, Universitas Pancasila), Mr. Suyoto (Regent of Bojonegoro Regency) and Dr. Zamroni Salim who presented the policy paper.



## The Habibie Center's 14th Anniversary Celebration and 2013 Habibie Award Ceremony

On 19 November 2013, The Habibie Center celebrated its 14th anniversary. The celebration of the Center that was established on 10 November 1999 was held at the Le Meridien Hotel, Jakarta. A series of activities were conducted and proved real contribution of The Habibie Center in advancing modernization and monitoring the progress of democratization in Indonesia.

At the beginning, The Habibie Center started the celebration with the "ASEAN-EU High Level Dialogue on Maritime Cooperation" entitled Towards an Integrated Maritime Cooperation: An Exchange of Lessons and Experiences between ASEAN and the EU. This forum was held on Monday, 18 November 2013 and followed by a public forum on Tuesday, 19 November 2013 from 09.00 to 11.0 am. After the public forum, the event continued with Habibie Awards 2013 that was conducted on the same day on 12.00 pm. Awards are given to four researchers that have been selected by the committee regarding to their contribution to science and knowledge development in Indonesia.

The first researcher awarded Habibie Awards on Basic Science is Dr. Anto Sulaksono, M.Si., a theoretical nuclear



expert from University of Indonesia. His research contributes to answering some questions on nuclear structure, nuclear materials, and neutron star. The second researcher awarded Habibie Awards on Medical and Biotechnology is Prof. Dr. Irwandi Jaswir, M.Sc., pioneer of halal science who has published 63 papers in several international journals and received many international awards. One of the awards he received is Asia Pacific Young Scientist Awards in 2010. The third researcher awarded Habibie Awards on Engineering Science is Prof. Dr. Mohammad Nasikin, M.Eng, lecturer of Chemical Engineering,

University of Indonesia. Lastly, the fourth researcher awarded Habibie Awards on Culture and Humanities is Prof. Dr. Abdul Hadi Wiji Muthari, professor of religion philosophy from University of Paramadina and spoke person for Islam Nusantara.

These series of event was closed by a talk show entitled "Mass Media Independency in 2014 Election, May it be?" on the same day from 6.00 to 9.00 pm at Sasono Mulya Room 1 & 2, Le Meridien Hotel, Jakarta. The theme of the talk show is actual and timely since it discussed media independency that is being a highlight and questions from public recently.

The speakers of the talk show are Arif Zulkifli (Editor in Chief, Tempo Magazine), Husni Kamil Manik (Chairman of the General Election Commission), Tantowi Yahya (Member of Commission 1, House of Representative / Spoke person Golkar), and Gun Gun Heryanto (Political Communication Exper, UIN Jakarta) and the session was moderated by Latief Siregar from Sindo Trijaya.

## **Round Table Discussion: “ Culture of Peace in an ASEAN Regional Perspective”**

Jakarta, 14 March 2013

On Thursday 14th March 2013 and Friday 15th March 2013, The Habibie Center in collaboration with ASEAN Foundation held a seminar and public forum on a “Culture of Peace in an ASEAN Regional Perspective” in Jakarta. The objectives of the one-and-a-half day event were to discuss the significance of a ‘culture of peace’

concept; to develop the concept into an ASEAN regional perspective; and to identify ways at socializing an ASEAN regional perspective on the ‘culture of peace’ to the governments and peoples of ASEAN.

Fully supported by the Government of Canada, the seminar and public forum was inaugurated by an opening ceremony featuring a keynote speech by H.E. Mr Djoko Suyanto, Coordinating Minister for Politics, Law and Security Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia. The opening ceremony also heard remarks from H.E. Dr. Makarim

Wibisono (Executive Director of the ASEAN Foundation), Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim (Executive Director of The Habibie Center), H.E. Ambassador Donald Bobiash (Ambassador of Canada to Indonesia), H.E. Mr. H.S. Dillon (Presidential Special Envoy for Poverty Alleviation) and H.E. K.H. Hasyim Muzadi (Secretary-General of International Conference of Islamic Scholars (ICIS)).

A closed roundtable discussion then followed where over the course of five sessions on Day 1, expert participants selected from the region frankly and openly addressed key questions such as: the current state of affairs in the ASEAN region in relation to peace, violence, and conflict; if a culture of violence exists among Southeast Asians; and identifying alternative ways of achieving a lasting peace that goes beyond the simple absence of conflict but exists in the minds of men themselves. Other key issues included: the roles of political apathy, economic disillusionment and social alienation as driving factors for political/communal violence; the challenges, experiences and perspectives of individual ASEAN Member States regarding their reconciliation processes; and why pluralism and diversity should not be feared as a threat to national unity or cultural identity but instead be celebrated as something truly positive, enriching and peace-inducing.

During each session, a specially-selected expert was invited to present a discussion paper that served to trigger a discourse with their peers. These specially-selected experts were Mr. Suos Yara (Advisor to Prime Minister, Vice Chairman of Commission for External Relations, Cambodian People's Party), Dr. Rudi Sukandar (Researcher, The Habibie Center, Indonesia). Ms. Altaf Deviyati (Penang Institute, Malaysia) and Ms. Lorea N. Castro, Ph.D. (Executive Director, Center for Peace Education, Miriam College, the Philippines). At the end of Day 1 the participants proposed Key Elements of an ASEAN Culture of Peace and Key Recommendations towards developing an ASEAN Culture of Peace.

On Day 2 a public forum was held to relate the discussions, findings and outcomes of all the previous sessions of the seminar to the public. A key aim of the public forum was to give the public an opportunity to have an open discussion with the expert participants by asking questions, giving inputs and commenting on any issues surrounding the development of an ASEAN Regional Perspective on a Culture of Peace. The public forum heard a number of valuable feedbacks from the public especially on the Key Elements of an ASEAN Culture of Peace and Key Recommendations towards developing an ASEAN Culture of Peace which was distributed during the public forum.



## “ASEAN Dialogue on Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership: Implication for ASEAN’s External Economic Relations and Policies”

29 July 2013

The Habibie Center held an ASEAN public dialogue on the subject of “Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership: Implication for ASEAN’s External Economic Relations and Policies” at The Habibie Center Building in Jakarta. The dialogue featured H.E. Amb. David Taylor (New Zealand Embassy to the Republic of Indonesia), Mr. Yoshifumi Fukunaga

(Economic Research Institute for ASEAN and East Asia) and Dr. Zamroni Salim (The Habibie Center/ LIPI), with Dr. Alexander C. Chandra (Trade Knowledge Network IISD) serving as moderator. The objectives of the ASEAN Dialogue were: (a) to discuss the potential implications of RCEP to ASEAN’s external economic relations and policies; (b) to gauge potential interest of existing strategic economic partners of ASEAN engage into the RCEP initiative, as well as the responses of the RCEP’s members to it; (c) to explore further potential opportunities and challenges in the potential expansion of the RCEP.

Mr. Yoshifumi Fukunaga opened the discussion by explaining the economic

rationale for the RCEP and discussed the financial benefits and advantages that were expected. The economic rationale and discussion provided a useful context to frame the central focus of the discussion: the “Open Accession Clause.” He along with the other speakers spent a great deal of the discussion on Principle 6 of the RCEP Guiding Principles and Objectives to debate what other external actor s could apply for the open accession clause, what the process was and what were the challenges. In particular, the dialogue examined the possibilities of Taiwan, Hong Kong and Macau of joining the RCEP.

In his presentation, Dr. Zamroni Salim focused on the fact that according to WTO rules, there should be no bar on



WTO members from entering Free Trades Agreement with one another. As such, he suggested that Taiwan, Hong Kong and Macau could join the RCEP using its status as WTO members and as “separate customs territories.” However he admitted that ASEAN’s concerns for the One China Policy was a political constraint that needed to be worked around. In this sense, the contributions of H.E. Amb. David Taylor was valuable as he explained how New Zealand was able to enter FTAs with not only China but also Taiwan, Hong Kong and Macau. Interestingly, he stated that New Zealand viewed having FTAs with China, Taiwan, Hong Kong and Macau as in keeping with the One China Policy and not in violation of it. He also went on to explain some of the expectations that New Zealand and other ASEAN+1 Partners had of the RCEP.

The dialogue then turned to Question and Answers which saw the speakers take three rounds of questions from the audience. Among the many issues raised were: would the RCEP only benefit the elites and big businesses or would it also have an impact on the common people; what was the impact of rival processes such as the Trans Pacific Partnership (TPP) on ASEAN Centrality; who should interested external economic partners such as the EU approach if it wanted to enter the RCEP; and when would the RCEP come into effect.



### **Talking ASEAN on U.S. Rebalancing to Asia and Chinese New Leadership**

On Tuesday, 17 September 2013, The Habibie Center held a public dialogue, Talking ASEAN on “U.S. Rebalancing to Asia and Chinese New Leadership: Challenges for ASEAN Centrality and its Implications on Neighbouring Countries” at The Habibie Center Building, Jakarta. The Talking ASEAN featured Prof. Dr. Dewi Fortuna Anwar (Chair of Institute for Democracy and Human Rights, The Habibie Center), Dr. Tsai Ming-Yen (Professor, Graduate School of International Politics, National Chung-Hsing University), Drs. Makmur Keliat Ph.D. (Lecturer, International Relations Department, University of Indonesia) and Dr. Santo Darmosumarto (Assistant Special Staff on International Relations to the

President of Indonesia) as speakers and moderated by Dr. Alexander C. Chandra (Trade Knowledge Network IISD). The objectives of the Talking ASEAN dialogue were : (a) to discuss the challenges and opportunities of ASEAN Centrality, (b) to explore the U.S. position and examine implications of U.S. rebalancing strategy towards ASEAN Centrality, (c) to explore China’s position - under the new leadership of President Xi Jinping - towards ASEAN Centrality, (d) to discuss the implications of ASEAN Centrality, the U.S. rebalancing and China’s new leadership on neighbouring countries in the region, (e) to suggest ways in which ASEAN Centrality can be maintained and enhanced in the midst of U.S. rebalancing and China’s rise.



## Talking ASEAN on ASEAN Connectivity : Opportunities for Business and Shaping ASEAN Identity

On Tuesday, October 29, 2013, The Habibie Center held a Talking ASEAN discussion on “ASEAN Connectivity : Opportunities for Business and Shaping ASEAN Identity” at The Habibie Center building in Jakarta. The Talking ASEAN discussion featured Mr. Lim Chze Cheen (Head of ASEAN Connectivity Division, ASEAN Secretariat), Mr. V. Raman Narayanan (ASEAN Affairs and Government Relations, Air Asia ASEAN) and Ms. Meili Hsiao (Digital Education Institute, Institute for Information Industry) as the resource persons and Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim (Executive Director, The Habibie Center) as moderator. The aims of this Talking ASEAN were: (a) to discuss initiatives to promote connectivity among ASEAN member-states; (b) to explore opportunities to expand the Master Plan on ASEAN Connectivity, especially the possible contributions from ASEAN Dialogue Partners; (c) to discuss the meaning of ASEAN Identity; & (d) to discuss strategies to promote and facilitate greater “people to people interaction” in ASEAN.



### **Talking ASEAN on The AEC 2015's Free Movement of Labour**

Jakarta, 11 December 2013

On Wednesday, 11 December 2013, The Habibie Center held a Talking ASEAN dialogue on the subject of “The AEC 2015's Free Movement of Labour: Implications for Migrant Workers' Rights” at The Habibie Center Building, Jakarta. This Talking ASEAN featured two resource persons namely Dr. Muhammad Iqbal (President, Union Migrant Indonesia) and Ms. Kartini Isabelle Pouchous (Project Development Officer, International Organization for Migration), with Dr. Alexander Chandra (Southeast Asia Coordinator, Trade Knowledge Network) as moderator. The objectives of the Talking ASEAN dialogue were:

(a) to review the current state of affairs regarding labour migration management within the ASEAN region, with a particular focus on migrant workers and their rights, (b) to explore the implementation of the ASEAN Economic Community in 2015, specifically the provisions for the free movement of labour that will impact on labor migration in ASEAN, (c) to analyze the implications of these policy for ASEAN member states, (d) to analyze ASEAN's efforts to introduce the instrument of ASEAN Declaration on the Protection and Promotion of the Rights of Migrant Workers, and (e) to discuss the practices of policies and procedures that can be learned from countries in ASEAN and Asia in dealing with migrant workers.

## **International Scholar's Series: An Assessments of Malaysia's 13th General Election**

Jakarta, 5 June 2013

On Wednesday, 5 June 2013, The Habibie Center held an International Scholar Series public lecture and discussion on An Assessments of Malaysia's 13th General Election. The public lecture and discussions featured Prof. Bridget Welsh (Associate Professor, Singapore Management University) and was moderated by Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim (Executive Director, The Habibie Center).

The event which was opened by Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim, heard Prof. Bridget Welsh present an overview of the general election, the campaign, and then the irregularities during campaign and election. Afterwards, Prof. Bridget Welsh discussed her analysis on the polls result. Following Prof. Bridget Welsh's thorough and comprehensive presentation, the floor was opened for a question and answer session which saw Prof. Dr. Dewi Fortuna Anwar raise a question regarding how the ideology has changed now and how can it affect Malaysian politics in general. Prof. Dr. Dewi Fortuna Anwar also asked whether or not it was realistic to get

a majority of votes and at the same time having a viable government. Prof. Bridget Welsh responded by explaining the legitimacy of the opposition.

The discussion ended with a question from Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim on Prof. Bridget Welsh's predictions on the futures of both Malaysia's governing and opposition leaders and also on Indonesia's 2014 elections. Prof. Bridget Welsh answered that there will be more focus on the Muslim world as well as giving her thoughts for the upcoming UMNO party election in Malaysia as well as predicting that the Governor of Jakarta had a good chance in Indonesia's 2014 elections.

### **The Habibie Center International Scholar's Series featuring Professor Mohammed El Sayed Selim**

On Wednesday, August 28, 2013, The Habibie Center in collaboration with Paramadina Graduate School held an International Scholars' Series. The event held on the campus of Paramadina Graduate School in Energy Building, Jakarta presented Professor Mohammed El Sayed Selim (Professor of Political Science of Cairo University, Egypt) as a speaker and Rahimah Abdulrahim (Executive Director, The Habibie Center) as moderator. The purpose of this event was to listen to experts views from the professor about

the latest development of the political situation in Egypt.

Prof. Mohammed El-Sayed Selim is the Director of the Center for Asian Studies in the Faculty of Economics and Political Science, Cairo University, Egypt. He is also a Professor of Political Science with his expertise being in International Relations and Comparative Politics (especially regarding theories, foreign policy, the Middle East and Asia). He has written and edited many publications over the years including: "The Cultural Dimensions of the Euro-Mediterranean Partnership" (2001); "The Extra-regional Environment of Egyptian-Iranian Relations: Opportunities and Risks" (2002) & "Multi-Lateralism, Globalization, and the Muslim World:

Prospects for the Future" (2002). Prof. Mohammed El-Sayed Selim previously received a B.A. in Political Science from Cairo University in 1967, a M.A. in Political Science from Cairo University in 1972, and a Ph.D in Political Science from Carleton University in 1979.

This event was attended by more than 40 participants coming from various backgrounds and institutions such as; embassies, media, universities, and ngos. The event lasted for two hours and offered participants an open question and answer session with the professor. During the session, many questions were raised including the issues about human rights and political security.

## Dedicated Program and Research for Peace and Development



### **Research: National Violence Monitoring System (NVMS)**

January 2012-April 2015

National Violence Monitoring System (NVMS) is implemented by The Habibie Center in collaboration with The Deputy Coordinating Ministry for People's Welfare, with the support from Conflict and Development Program-World Bank since 2012. The program is funded by the Korea Economic Transitions and Peacebuilding Trust Fund.

This program aims to strengthen the capacity of institutions in Indonesia in detecting and responding to social conflicts through data and analysis. Through this program, data on the incidences and impacts of violence obtained from thirteen provinces namely Nangroe Aceh Darussalam (NAD), West Kalimantan, Maluku, North Maluku, Central Sulawesi, Papua, West Papua, East Nusa Tenggara (NTT), and the Jakarta-Bogor-Depok-Tangerang-Bekasi (Jabodetabek). Based on the data, The Habibie Center publishes Policy Briefs as a result of the

analysis in the form of peace and policy studies every four months. NVMS data is published on [www.sn timer-indonesia.com](http://www.sn timer-indonesia.com). Other activities that are part of this program are the Violence Intensity Index, Thematic Studies, Regional Workshops and National Seminars. All the analysis and activities are published on [www.sn timer-indonesia.com](http://www.sn timer-indonesia.com) and [www.habibiecenter.or.id](http://www.habibiecenter.or.id).

In 2013, NVMS launched three editions of Policy Brief. The third edition was launched in April 2013. The third edition includes Map of Violence in Indonesia (September-December 2012) and issues raised in nine provinces throughout 2012. In August, NVMS launched the fourth edition of Peace and Policy Review that included map of violence in Indonesia in the period of January-April 2013 and analysis on the issue of local electoral violence. Starting from the fifth edition of Peace and Policy Review that was launched in December 2013, there are four additional provinces that covered by this program namely Lampung, Central Kalimantan, East Kalimantan, and West Nusa Tenggara (NTB). Besides providing data on map of violence in Indonesia during May-August 2013, the fifth edition also included the analysis on land dispute between local residents in East Nusa Tenggara Province.

## Expert Workshop on Violence Intensity Index

Jakarta, 29 April 2013

On Monday, April 29, 2013, The Habibie Center through the NVMS project (National Violence Monitoring System) held an expert workshop on: Violence Intensity Index Methodology. The Violence Intensity Index in this workshop was presented by Sofyan as a representative of NVMS - The Habibie Center.

The Violence Intensity Index has the following purposes and benefits:

1. Provide mapping of vulnerable areas of violent conflict in Indonesia
2. Provide identification and monitoring of violent incidents from time to time
3. Provide understanding as to prevent violence in the vulnerable areas for the future

This workshop was attended by experts from various institution, and included Iwan Gardono (FISIP UI), M. Sairi Hasbullah (BPS), Wahyudi Djafar (Elsam), Indrajaya (Bappenas), Zuraini (Kemenko Kesra), A. Djadja S (FISIP UNPAD), Yunes Herawati dan Fauziah Amir (Ditpolkam Bappenas), Novri Susan (UNAIR), Abdul Malik Gismar (Paramadina), dan Wahyu (World Bank). The Habibie Center was represented by Sofyan Cholid, Imron Rasyid, M. Ansori, Sopar, dan Hadi Kuntjara.

The workshop ended with the explanation from the NVMS team that in the future the team will build the structure of the index and see if they had the possibility of re-classification. The end results of the Violence Intensity Index will form an inventory, snap shot and description that not only portray violence in Indonesia as a whole but also based on the classification and level of violence



# High Level Dialogue

## Taking Discussion to a Higher Platform



### **ASEAN-EU High Level Dialogue on Maritime Cooperation**

Jakarta, 18 November 2013

Maritime cooperation is a complex and multifaceted challenge which has acquired growing importance for both ASEAN and the EU. In accordance to that, on Monday, 18 November 2013, The Habibie Center, in collaboration with the Directorate General for ASEAN Cooperation of Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Republic of Indonesia,

the European External Action Service, and the Regional EU-ASEAN Dialogue Instrument held an ASEAN-EU High Level Dialogue on Maritime Cooperation at the Puri Asri 1 & 2, Le Meridien Hotel, Jakarta. This High Level Dialogue involved in total 18 expert speakers from EU and ASEAN member states and 23 participants flying in from ASEAN countries. Also coming to the High Level Dialogue were ambassadors, embassy officials, related ministries and media persons.

Prior to the dialogue, the Opening Ceremony was held and graced by the presence of H.E. Mr. Le Luong Minh, Secretary General of ASEAN Secretariat; Mr. Jose Tavares, Director for Political-Security Affairs, Directorate General for ASEAN Cooperation, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia, Mr. Ugo Astuto Director for South and South-East Asia, European External Action Service; and Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim, Executive Director of The Habibie Center, who each delivered a remark at 9.00 - 9.30 am.

The Opening Ceremony was then followed by a closed Roundtable Discussion whereby the specially invited Expert Speakers and Participants from the European Union and ASEAN member-states discussed a variety of topics related to Maritime Cooperation. The dialogue was divided into 4 sessions and ran from 10.00 am to 5.00 pm.

In session 1, Dr. Ralf Emmers, Prof. Natalino Ronzitti, and Prof. Ramses Amer from the EU and Prof. Diane Desierto and Dr. Nguyen Cat Ngoc from ASEAN shared their perspectives about the topic of developing a rules-based regional regime for maritime cooperation: strengthening regional institutions and international legal frameworks which was moderated by Mr. Steven Everts. Session 2 was aimed to discuss the strategy to tackling traditional and non-traditional threats to maritime security at the regional level through cooperative means. The speakers for session two were Mr. Bruno Hellendorff and Mr. Christian Dupont from EU and Prof. Connie Rahakundini Bakrie and Capt. Sebastian Martin from ASEAN. This session was moderated by Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim.

In session 3, the topic of the discussion focused on ensuring joint and sustainable management of marine

resources in a way that would engage all stakeholders. The speakers for this session were Mr. Fraser Cameron and Dr. Vasco Becker-Weinberg from EU and Mr. Mohd. Nizam Basiron, Amb. Alberto A. Encomienda, and Mr. I. Made Andi Arsana from ASEAN. The session was moderated by Commo (ret.) Carlos L. Agustin. The final session noted that maritime security is a business where lots of people are involved but nobody is in charge. In this case, EU is an easy and neutral partner of ASEAN. There was a need for ASEAN to deepen knowledge and expertise on marine biodiversity, fisheries and fish species and management on fisheries in ASEAN countries, which EU may have more knowledge and expertise on that. It was suggested that the recommendations on what the EU should do to cooperate with ASEAN on maritime issues be deepened further.



## Public Forum on ASEAN-EU High Level Dialogue: Towards an Integrated Maritime Cooperation

Jakarta, 19 November 2013

Day 2 of the “ASEAN-EU High Level Dialogue on Maritime Cooperation” involved a public forum being held to disseminate the results of the High Level Dialogue to a broader audience. On Tuesday, 19 November 2013, The Habibie Center, in collaboration with the Directorate General for ASEAN Cooperation of Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Republic of Indonesia, the European External Action Service, and the Regional EU-ASEAN Dialogue Instrument held a half-day Public Forum on “ASEAN-EU High Level Dialogue on Maritime Cooperation: Towards an Integrated Maritime Cooperation: An Exchange of Lessons and Experiences between ASEAN and the EU” at Sasono Mulyo Ballroom 1 & 2, Le Meridien Hotel, Jakarta.

At the Public Forum, H.E. Ambassador Agus Sriyono, Deputy to the Coordinating Minister for Political, Legal and Security Affairs and H.E. Ambassador Olof Skoog, Head of EU Delegation to Indonesia, Brunei Darussalam and ASEAN delivered welcome remarks. This then was followed by a keynote speech by Prof. Dr. Dewi Fortuna Anwar, Chairman of Institute of Democracy and Human Rights, The Habibie Center.

The rapporteur from EU was Mr. Fraser Cameron and the ones from ASEAN were Mr. Shahrizan Lockman and Prof. Diane Desierto. The forum was moderated by Mr. Ugo Astuto. During the forum, the rapporteurs raised a number of reflections and recommendations they felt ASEAN and the EU should pursue. Crucially, it was suggested that one of the EU’s motivations in supporting ASEAN was because the EU supported regionalism in general. One of the rapporteurs suggested that one of the most important recommendations for ASEAN was to strengthen its ASEAN Secretariat. This would enable/ensure effective implementation of regional policies by ASEAN’s member-states. Maritime cooperation would also allow ASEAN to benefit from the EU’s

capabilities in science and technological developments. Furthermore it was important to develop some regional maritime regimes to avoid the possibility of unilateralism and the dominance of the strongest.

The audience of this Public Forum was varied, consisting of embassies officials, officials from related ministries such as Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Marine Resources and Fishery, Ministry of Political, Legal and Security and Ministry of Research and Technology, academicians, and media persons. The Public Forum saw a very active and engaging discussion as the audience also shared their own perspectives and opinions as well as critically questioning the views of the rapporteurs.

The discussion, which was frank and open in nature, allowed the Indonesian experts and scholars to raise a number of other incidents and concerns currently felt within government and academic circles. There was agreement among all those in attendance that the issue of trust was an important element which had to be continually renewed.

## **Signing Agreement between The Habibie Center and KITLV**

THC and KITLV (Koninklijk Instituut voor taal- Land- en Volkenkunde) have signed an agreement to digitize the collections of KITLV library in Leiden, Netherland. The agreement is titled "Shared Digitization and Dissemination of KITLV Library Collections". This agreement was signed by Dr. Ahmad Watik Pratiknya as chairman of Board of Directors of THC and Prof. Gert Oostindie as a KITLV Director. The agreement is aimed for the two parties to work together the digitization process of KITLV library collections.

The agreement was signed at the opening of the Documentation Exhibition of Indonesia's History on 8 January 2013 in Erasmus Huis Taalcentrum, Netherland Embassy, Kuningan, Jakarta Selatan. The exhibition is scheduled to open from 9 January 2013 to 15 February 2013. Attending the opening exhibition were Netherland Ambassador for Indonesia Mr. Tjeerd de Zwaan, Former President of Indonesia B.J. Habibie, Vice Minister of Education and Culture Prof. Wiendu Nuryanti, the President of AIPI (the Indonesian Academy of Sciences) Prof. Sangkot Marzuki, Former Minister of Education Prof. Wardiman Djojonegoro, Head of Research and Industrial Technology Committee of Chamber of Commerce and Industry/

Chairman Institute for Democratization for Science & Technology of THC Dr. Ilham Habibie, and not less than 250 other invitees.

Digitization is not only aimed to save valuable library collections of KITLV Leiden especially about science and culture of Indonesia. It is also aimed to provide the public an easy access to library collections of KITLV in Leiden. In his speech, Mr. B.J. Habibie emphasized the importance of science for the betterment of the nation of Indonesia. He also conveyed the importance of paying attention, study and take lesson learned from the past so we will not repeat the same mistakes in the future. Therefore, he welcomed the signing of the agreement between THC and KITLV. Meanwhile, Director of KITLV called this collaboration as 'a first step to pursue a new history in the world of education'.

As a follow-up of the agreement, meetings have been held between the two parties in KITLV office in Jakarta. For the initial stage, it was agreed that the collections which will be digitized are those in the area of energy (oil, mining and geology). The estimation number of the collections is about 500 titles or equals to 100,000 pages.

The discussion lasted for about 2 hours and concluded that the key to success for Public Diplomacy Indonesia today was communication with the Indonesian government and various sectors in discussing certain issues to disseminate government policies through the role of the NGO community and think tanks.

The discussion lasted for 2 hours and concluded that in the ASEAN region, the democratization process is still a vital key for every country. Indonesia is actually a good example in the changes from authoritarian system to a more democratic system, however Indonesia can only give its best and worst practice to other countries that still struggle to become more democratic and cannot teach them how, as the process has its own trial and error.

## Book Reading Smoke and Mirrors

## Discussion with Komisi Penyiaran Indonesia Daerah (KPID) Bengkulu

On Wednesday, July 3rd 2013, The Habibie Center was honored to receive a visit and discussion from KPID Bengkulu which was represented by its institutional staffs, Susi Soraya, Kencanawati and Irna Riza. The objective of the discussion was to exchange views about THC Media Watch, its implementing activities, and the possibilities of cooperation. The discussion was attended by Hadi Kuntjara (Deputy Director for Operation), Wenny Pahlemy, Afdal Makkuraga Putra, and Bawono Kumoro.

The discussion, which lasted for approximately 90 minutes begun by a warm welcome and opening from Hadi Kuntjara, followed by the main agenda on media watch as a directing pillar for creating an ethical media within a democratic state. Wenny Pahlemy explained that THC Media Watch was established in 1999 as an effort of THC in directing the role and freedom of media to encourage democracy that could be classified into three main programs, namely: publication of Media Watch journal once a month which consisted of news analysis; a coalition with various non



governmental organizations (NGOs) by establishing 'koalisi anti ampol' for Indonesian journalists; and media literacy. The media literacy program was held in Depok, Palu, and Ambon, with the objective of educating the people on how they could actively play a role in conflict resolution via the use of information from media.

The discussion then continued by the highlighting of several key problems found in the realities of the media's role in Indonesia by Afdal Makkuraga. The KPID Bengkulu group also felt there were several similarities between THC and KPID Bengkulu, such as advancing the values of tolerance, democracy,

media literacy, and human right. Bawono Kumoro outlined the general pattern that the news publication of Indonesian medias were becoming a mainstream tool to serve the political interests of their owners.



### **Study Visit by American University's ASEAN Study Program**

On Monday, July 8th 2013, The Habibie Center was honoured to receive a study visit by the American University's ASEAN Study Program at The Habibie Center Building in Jakarta. Led by Professor Pek Koon Heng (Director, ASEAN Studies Center, School of International Service, American University), the visiting delegation was made up of eight graduate and postgraduate students taking part in the ASEAN Summer Program. The purpose of their visit was to hear a lecture from Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim (Executive Director, The Habibie

Center) on Indonesia-ASEAN-US relations. Also in attendance was Mr. A. Ibrahim Almuttaqi (ASEAN Studies Program Officer, The Habibie Center).

Ms. Rahimah Abdulrahim began by acknowledging the various criticisms leveled at ASEAN and noted how the drastic change from Indonesia's successful chairmanship of ASEAN to Cambodia's controversial chairmanship revealed the regional organization's dysfunction. She also highlighted how not only Indonesian officials but also the public increasingly questioned what ASEAN had done for Indonesia; question she felt had not been adequately answered to date.

Topics raised include: the fate of Indonesian migrant workers; ASEAN identity and citizenship; the Trans Pacific Partnership and Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership; and the ASEAN Way among others. The visit ended with the American University delegation receiving several gift books from The Habibie Center.
