
Foreword from the Executive Director

Over the past year, we have taken a number of strategic programs and activities, responding to our increasingly unpredictable and rapidly changing world. Over 24 years, we have consistently advanced our primary principle to promote the modernization and democratization of Indonesian society based on the morality and the integrity of sound cultural and religious values. We believe that democracy should be fought with determinism and not be taken granted. The world's biggest challenge now is not only related to the worsening global economy, deepening inhumanity, climate crisis, and diverse political security threats, but also importantly to declining democracy.

The global trend indicates that the world is getting less democratic. Many countries have reverted to authoritarianism, while in others, including established democracies, there are signs of deterioration in the quality of freedom. Between 1974 and 2005, a majority of states became democratic for the first time in history. Samuel P. Huntington would call the "third wave" of global democratization. However, a global democratic recession began in 2006 and has persisted –and deepened – over the past 19 years.



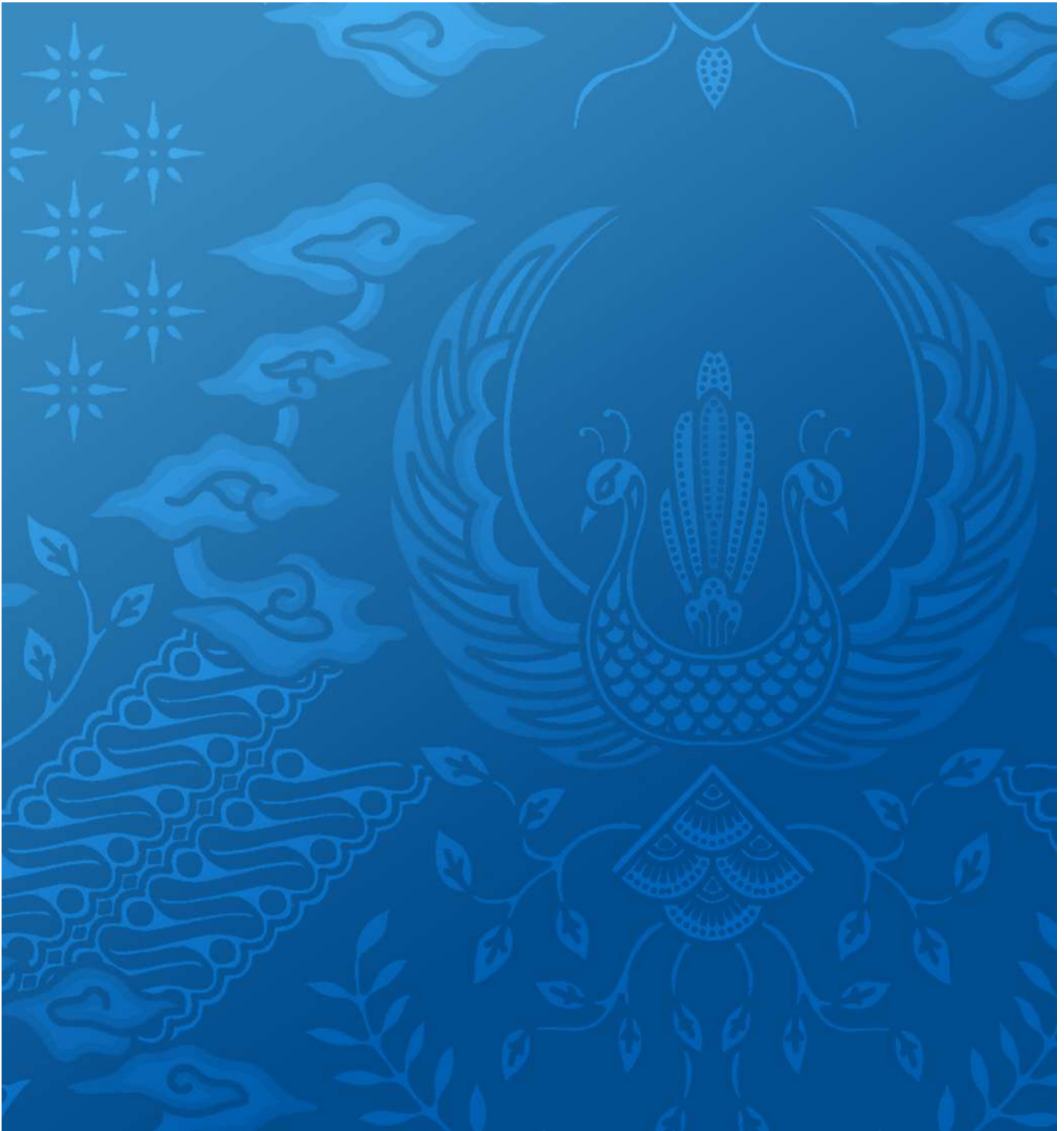

Measuring the High Cost of Politics & The Impact on the Quality of Democracy & National Leadership

16 March 2023

On Thursday, 16 March 2023, The Habibie Center hosted the second session of the “Dialog Demokrasi Menuju Pemilu 2024” series, titled “Menakar Mahalnya Ongkos Politik Dan Dampaknya Terhadap Kualitas Demokrasi Dan Kepemimpinan Nasional 2024.” The discussion focused on the rising costs of political campaigns in Indonesia, highlighting the challenges posed by logistics, money politics, and vote-buying. The event explored how these issues could threaten the integrity of the 2024 simultaneous elections and the consolidation of democracy in Indonesia. The session featured insights from Fahri Hamzah SE (Vice Chairman of Partai Gelora), Boni Hargens, PhD (Political Observer), Rahmat Bagja SH, LLM (Chairman of Bawaslu RI), and Khoirunnisa Nur Agustyati (Executive Director of Perludem), with Pitut Pramuji, MA (Associate Fellow, The Habibie Center), moderating the discussion.



Women Towards Parliament 2024: Consolidation of Women’s NGOs and Pre & Post Election Capacity Building

6 April 2023

On Thursday, 6 April 2023, The Habibie Center, in collaboration with BRIN’s Gender and Politics Team, the Indonesian Women’s Coalition (KPI), and Perludem, launched the “Perempuan Menuju Parlemen 2024: Konsolidasi Ornop Perempuan & Penguatan Kapasitas Pra & Paska Pemilu” workshop and gala discussion. The event addressed the challenges of increasing female participation in Indonesia’s parliament, emphasizing the role of non-governmental women’s organizations in promoting female political leadership.

The launch featured remarks by Drs. Julian Aldrin Pasha, M.A., Ph.D. (Chairman of The Habibie Center), a keynote speech by Diah Pitaloka (Chairperson of the Indonesian Women Parliament Caucus), and a panel moderated by Heroik Pratama (Researcher, Perludem).



International Seminar on “Democracy in Indonesia Post-2024”

21 November 2023

A Review on Indonesia's Leadership Priorities in ASEAN in the Politics-Security Pillar

8 February 2023

Social Science Commission-Indonesian Academy of Sciences (Komisi Ilmu Sosial - Akademi Ilmu Pengetahuan Indonesia/KIS-AIPI) and The Habibie Center (THC) held a national seminar entitled, "A Review on Indonesia's Leadership Priorities in ASEAN in the Politics-Security Pillar." This seminar aimed to socialize Indonesia's role and examine the priorities and challenges Indonesia's 2023 chairmanship in ASEAN would meet in providing various alternative solutions to maintain regional political stability and security. The seminar took place at Ruang Serbaguna Lantai 4, the National Library of the Republic of Indonesia. The total number of participants who attended offline was 125 people, while 128 people attended via Zoom. In addition, as of February 12, 2023, the number of seminar views on the THC and KIS-API Youtube channels totaled 549.

8 June 2023

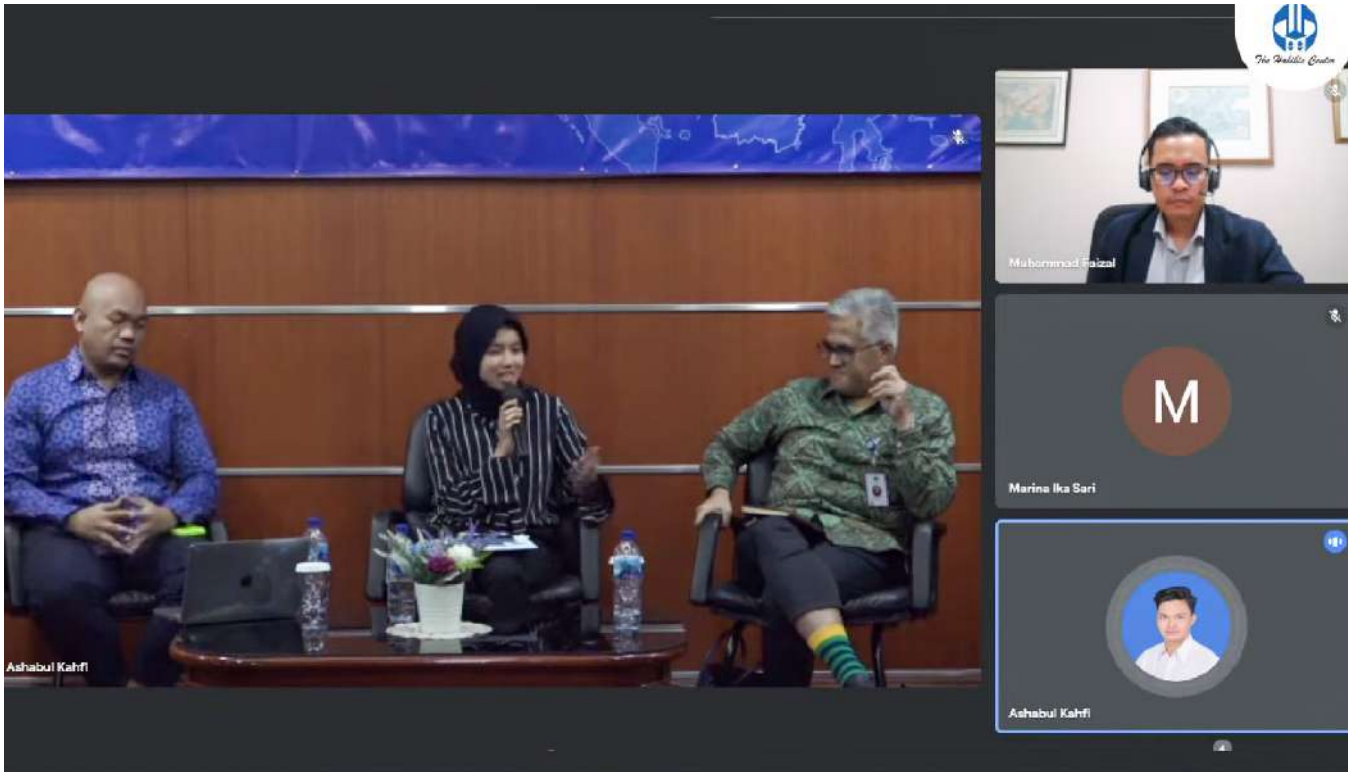

National Seminar, "ASEAN as the Epicentre of Growth: Towards an Inclusive and Integrated ASEAN under the Chairmanship of Indonesia"

On July 25, 2023, the Social Sciences Commission of the Indonesian Academy of Sciences (KIS-AIPI) and The Habibie Center (THC) organized a national seminar titled, "ASEAN as the Epicenter of Growth: Towards an Inclusive and Integrated ASEAN under the Chairmanship of Indonesia." The seminar aims to (1) identify the achievements and challenges of the ASEAN Economic Community (AEC) in implementing the AEC Blueprint 2025; (2) explore the impact of trade agreements in the ASEAN region on economic growth and the well-being of ASEAN societies; and (3) analyze economic development disparities in the ASEAN region and the integration of Timor Leste into the AEC. This seminar is the second in a series of three seminars scheduled for 2023.

The speakers at this seminar are Ir. Netty Muharni, MURP (Assistant Deputy for Regional and Sub-Regional Economic Cooperation, Coordinating Ministry for Economic Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia), Dr. Zamroni Salim (Senior Researcher THC, Head of the Center for Macro Economic and Financial Research at BRIN), and Dr. Fithra Faisal Hastiadi (Executive Director of Next Policy). The national seminar is moderated by Prof. Dr. Dewi Fortuna Anwar, M.A. (Chair of the Board of Trustees of THC, Member of KIS-AIPI).

The seminar takes place at the Indonesian Academy of Sciences (AIPI) Office on the 17th Floor, National Library of the Republic of Indonesia. The total number of participants attending in person is 41, while the total number of participants attending online via Zoom is 78. Bovonethat Douangchak (Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary Ambassador, Deputy Remain Laos for ASEAN) as speakers and Herawati (Researcher, the ASEAN Studies Program, The Habibie Center) as moderator.

1st Online Forum of the ASCC R&D Platform for Poverty Action: ASEAN Community Vision 2045 and Challenges in Poverty Alleviation

The process of developing ASEAN Community's Post-2025 Vision (or 2045 Vision) started in 2022, with the goal charting the region's journey to a more inclusive, resilient and sustainable ASEAN Community that leaves no one behind. The Habibie Center, as the Advisor of Poverty Action Platform for The ASEAN Socio-Cultural Community (ASCC) Research and Development Platforms, held a webinar intended to unpack key policy considerations impacting approaches to poverty alleviation in order to explore potential pathways that will inform and enrich the development of ASEAN Community's 2045 Vision. 24 - 27 July 2023

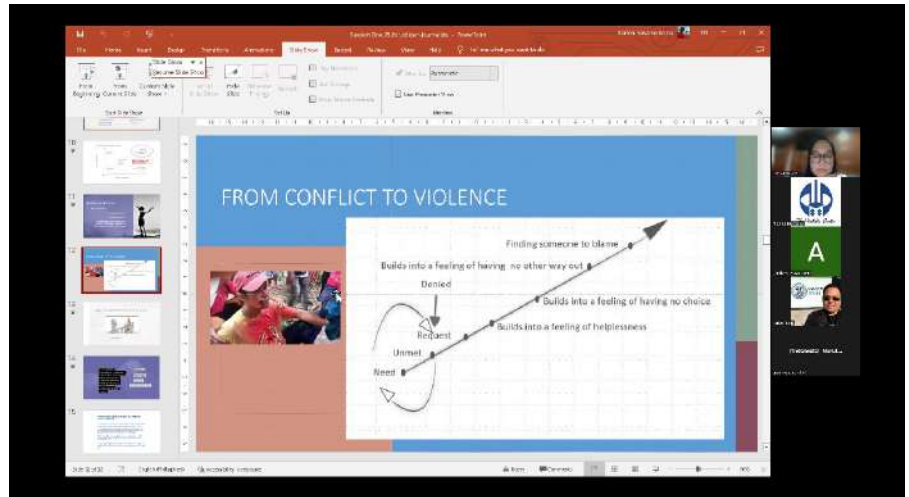

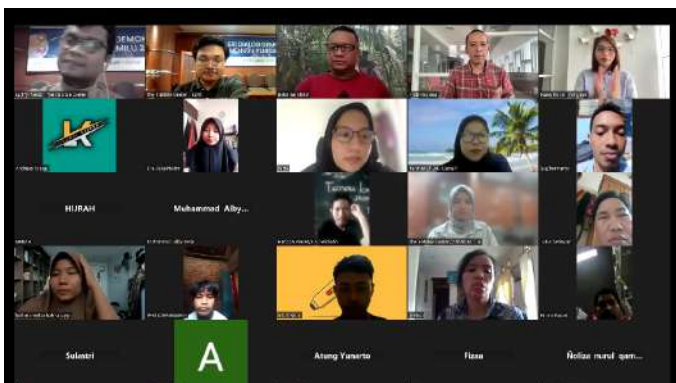

Strengthening the Capacity of Youth Journalists on Citizen Journalism to Promote Peace and Democracy in Conflict-Affected Areas of Indonesia, Thailand, Myanmar, and the Philippines

19-28 January 2023

The Habibie Center in cooperation with Canada Funds for Local Initiatives (CFLI) held two weeks period of Training of Trainers (ToT) are carried out based on a bespoke module formulated beforehand. The trainers, which involve a total of 15 professional journalists, will be pooled from the selected countries. The objectives are: (1) To transfer knowledge from Master of Trainers/Facilitators to journalists based on Module for Citizen Journalism in Conflict-Affected Areas in ASEAN; (2) To equip youth journalists with sets of skills in using conflict mapping tools and producing conflict-sensitive news reports by using peace journalism principles; and (3) To prepare youth journalists to deliver materials in the Module to citizen journalists in the empowerment sessions.



Talkshow Citizen Journalist (Empowerment Session)

12 February 2023

After 2 weeks of Training of trainers (ToT) in January, all the trainers involved in a Talkshow Citizen Journalist. These respective trainers will engage a total of 10 Citizen Journalists, making it a total of

150 Citizen Journalists, and conduct the Citizen Journalists Development Session within one-week time frame. The end goal of our project is to increase citizen participation in the production and dissemination of journalism products that will contribute to peace and stronger democracy in conflict-affected areas of four selected ASEAN countries.

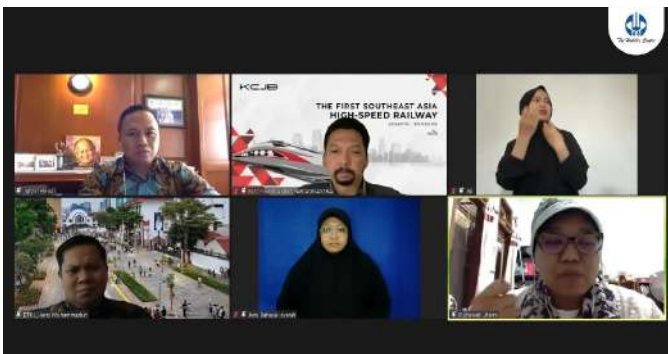


Workshop of Civilian Protection and Harm Mitigation for Indonesian Civil Society Representatives

22 February 2023

Center for Civilians in Conflict (CIVIC) and The Habibie Center, co-host a workshop on “Civilian Protection and Civilian Harm Mitigation in Indonesia”. This workshop is designed to bring experts and representatives of civil society together to discuss the most pressing issues specific to the Indonesian context and to develop

a set of notional recommendations for shaping Indonesian policy and practice. The workshop will also allow for opportunities to discuss lessons learned from other contexts, including the U.S. Europe, the Middle East, Africa, and Central Asia. The objective of the workshop was to identify the most important priorities, points of emphasis, and opportunities for strengthening measures to protect people from violence and armed conflict both now and in the future.

This FGD becomes one of data collection processes related to institutional ability in responding child association with terrorist group in Indonesia and abroad. The Participants come from government (BNPT, Special Detachment 88 and Ministry of Foreign Affairs)) and non-government (DASPR, INFID, CDS, BPET MUI) institutions.



FGD III “Strengthening Government Agencies in Handling and Rehabilitate Children Affiliated with Terrorism Organizations”

3 May 2023



The third FGD is the last FGD which aims to gain input and suggestion from the experts for the research report written by The Habibie Center. The participants checked and added the additional data in order to make the report more comprehensive. The FGD was attended by Special Detachment 88, BNPT, YPP, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, INFID, KPAI, Kejaksaan Agung, and KPPPA.

National Seminar “Efforts in Handling and Rehabilitation of Children Affiliated with Terrorism and Violent Extremism”

11 May 2023

The National Seminar entitled “Upaya Penanganan dan Rehabilitasi Anak-anak Terafiliasi Organisasi Terorisme dan Ekstremisme Berbasis Kekerasan” was the research dissemination and marked the end of research funded by USAID-HARMONI. There were four speakers: Leebarty Sitinjak from BNPT, Sopar Peranto from The Habibie Center, Wachid Ridwan representing academics and BPET MUI and Mira Kusumarini from Yayasan Empatiku. This seminar presented the research findings and collected the response from the experts. It was attended by around 70 people.





ASEAN Rising Leaders Program: Preventing Violence, Promoting Peace

13 - 20 May 2023

The Habibie Center in collaboration with ASEAN-U.S. Partnership for Regional Optimization Within the Political-Security and Socio-Cultural Communities (PROSPECT) conducted “ASEAN Rising Leaders Program: Preventing Violence, Promoting Peace”. This training involved 20 young ASEAN leaders, who have been successfully selected through a rigorous selection phase. This training aims not only to empower young community leaders by exposing them updated framework, knowledge on the social identity, conflict, violent extremism and gender dimension on Women, Peace, Security, but the program will also equip participants with knowledge and skills in conducting social analysis, managing and transforming conflict, facilitating intergroup dialogue, developing various digital contents and utilizing digital media platforms to promote public awareness in P/CVE through co-creation of digital contents and social media engagement. They work together in a team to develop different forms of digital contents (narrative, photovoice, audiovisual).

Inclass training I program Phycological Approach to Disengage Former Combatants and Communities from the Influence of Terrorist Groups in Poso, Central Sulawesi

12-18 July 2023

As know, Poso Regency in Central Sulawesi Province has its uniqueness as it transformed its conflict scale from communal violence to terrorism. The infiltration of several extremist and terrorist group led to the formation of a group called Esat Indonesia Mujahideen (MIT) in 2010, later affiliating with ISIS. Security operations in Poso have successfully halted this group, creating a safe situation for the community. Field assessments by The Habibie Center (THC) and Civil Society Strengthening Institute (LPMS) identified two significant challenges that need immediate response.

Firstly, the former terrorism convicts in Poso who have been released from prison. These individuals have undergone deradicalization and are currently in the process of reintegrating into society, emphasizing the importance of supporting this process and encouraging disengagement from terrorist groups. Secondly, there are indications of a large number of sympathizers or supporters at the grassroots level. Thirdly, there is a group of ex-combatants from past conflicts that also need to be reintegrated into the wider community of Poso district. The first and second challenges mentioned aboce have been taken into account by the government and other stakeholders. Deradicalization programs and various forms of assistance have been rolled out by the government.





However, there are several challenges faced in the field up to this point, which are: (1) The deradicalization program is individual-oriented and has limited impact beyond the individual itself; (2) The deradicalization program focuses on instilling loyalty to Indonesia rather than providing new life goals, marketable skills, or access to new networks; (3) Government assistance, including business capital, skill training, and access to local government project, has successfully steered ex-convicts away from extremism but has not halted recruitment or weakened support pockets for terrorist groups; (4) Government programs have been less effective in eliminating the threat of extremist group in the mountains of Poso Regency, despite significant reduction; and (5) There is currently no grassroots-level program for the reconciliation of former combatants. The in-class training is designed to enhance participants' knowledge and understanding of the following themes:

1. Identity Change; which includes the understanding of identity, types of identity, entities determining identity, identity and self-image, and projections of identity formation in the future.
2. Value Change; covering topics related to the understanding of values, sources of values, values deserving to be upheld and respected.
3. Positive communication and dialogue; encompassing the process of dialogue, active listening, understanding dialogue, and dialogue skills.
4. Providing space for participants to practice the materials learned during the training.

3. Provide feedback to each participant to strengthen the prepared business plans.
4. Provide space and opportunity for participants to interact more constructively.

Inclass training 2 program: Phycological Approach to Disengage Former Combatants and Communities from the Influence of Terrorist Groups in Poso, Central Sulawesi

20-27 September 2023

The in-class training 2 is designed to enhance participants' knowledge and understanding of the following themes:

1. Leader-Follower Relationship; which includes aspects of leaders and leadership, one's position in social relationships, critically examining leader-follower relationships, and role model leaders.
2. Appreciation; covering themes of the meaning of appreciation, the importance of appreciation, self-appreciation, and appreciation as a part of life.
3. Negotiation; covering themes of negotiation approaches, distinguishing wants and needs, as well as payment methods and concessions.
4. Financial Literacy; covering themes related to calculating production costs and techniques for managing the finances of both business and family.





Festival Danau Poso, program “Phycological Approach to Disengage Former Combatants and Communities from the Influence of Terrorist Groups in Poso, Central Sulawesi”

10-13 October 2023

The program team facilitates participants to participate by opening a booth named “Gerai ProposoKu”. The involvement of program participants in both activities is strategic for three reasons, which are: 1. Participants in the program begin to introduce their products to the wider community. This effort is an initial step to expand their market reach in the future; 2. Facilitating program participants to be more open-minded and capable of accepting differences in society. The program strats to bridge the relationship between program participants and the broader community, especially those with different beliefs, as the Poso Lake Festival is located in a city mostly of Christian faith and is a 2-hours drive from Poso City. Interestingly, program participants are very enthusiastic about participating in the festival. On the other hand, festival visitors can also see booth managed by veiled women whom they may no have encountered directly before. The interactions between exhibition booth attendants and various people from different religious groups that have long been devided in Poso after the conflicts that occured in the region in the early 2000s; 3. As knwon, the participant group are ex-terrorist considered anti-government. Therefore, their involvement in government-organized events can be an indicator of a shift from rejection to acceptance of government programs. The participation of participants in the two exhibitions mentioned above can also serve as an example for other communities to start cooperating or participating in government activities.



Outclass training 4: Program Psychological Approach to Disengage Former Combatants and Communities from the Influence of Terrorist Groups in Poso, Central Sulawesi

National Seminar on, “Counter-Terrorism strategies in a Political Year”

22 November 2023

“Facts indicate that Indonesia still faces terrorism threats to this day. In general, these threats can be categorized into two. The first threat is a short-term threat where terrorist group attacks are carried out by taking advantage of specific moments and exploiting the security apparatus’s negligence. An example of this is the suicide bomb attack at the Astana Anyar Police Resort, Bandung on December 2022. In this attack, the perpetrators exploited the moment of rejection by various elements of society and students against the enactment of the Criminal Code (KUHP). Instead of supporting this movement, the terrorist group clearly conveyed a message in their attack that the KUHP is a secular legal product contrary to divine law. Reflecting on this incident, it is crucial to mitigate and delve into terrorist attack plots in Indonesia leading up to and during the 2024 elections.

The second threat is a long-term threat where terrorist groups use democratic channels for anti-democratic purposes. As known, terrorist groups have changed their movement patterns from violence to preaching, fundraising from the community, and more persuasive approaches. Additionally, terrorist groups infiltrate political parties or attempt to establish political parties with the goal of constitutional jihad. It is suspected that this has occurred, one of the evidences is Farid Okbah establishing the PDRI party. The arrest of Farid Okbah by authorities in November 2021 revealed that he was allegedly involved in the terrorist network of the Jamaah Islamiyah group.

The use of political parties by terrorist groups has two opposing possibilities. On the positive side, it can be said that political parties can serve as one channel for terrorist groups to convey their aspirations peacefully. When peaceful options increase, the likelihood of resorting to violent means decreases. However, there is also a possibility that terrorist groups engage in hijacking, where they exploit democratic procedures or institutions for anti-democratic purposes.

To discuss this matter, The Habibie Center (THC) organized a national seminar titled “Counter-Terrorism Strategies in a Political Year”. This seminar is held as a part of the commemoration of THC’s 24th anniversary.

The National Seminar was held with the purpose as follows:

1. To identify terrorism threats in the political year in Indonesia in order to strengthen understanding of efforts that are currently underway and will be taken to mitigate and anticipate deadly terrorist attacks;
2. To discuss the government’s strategies in responding to these terrorist threats;
3. To formulate follow-up efforts that can be undertaken to enhance the capabilities of state institutions and the general public to participate in collective efforts to combat terrorism in Indonesia in the long-term.

28 November 2023

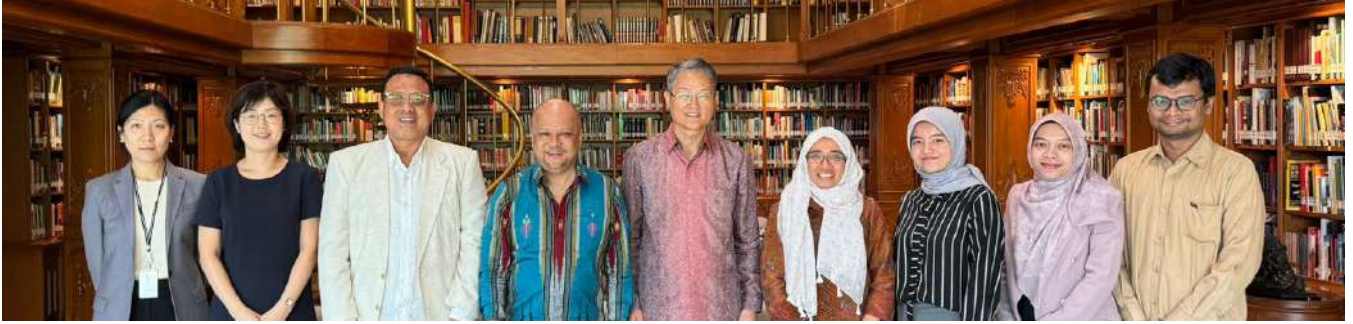

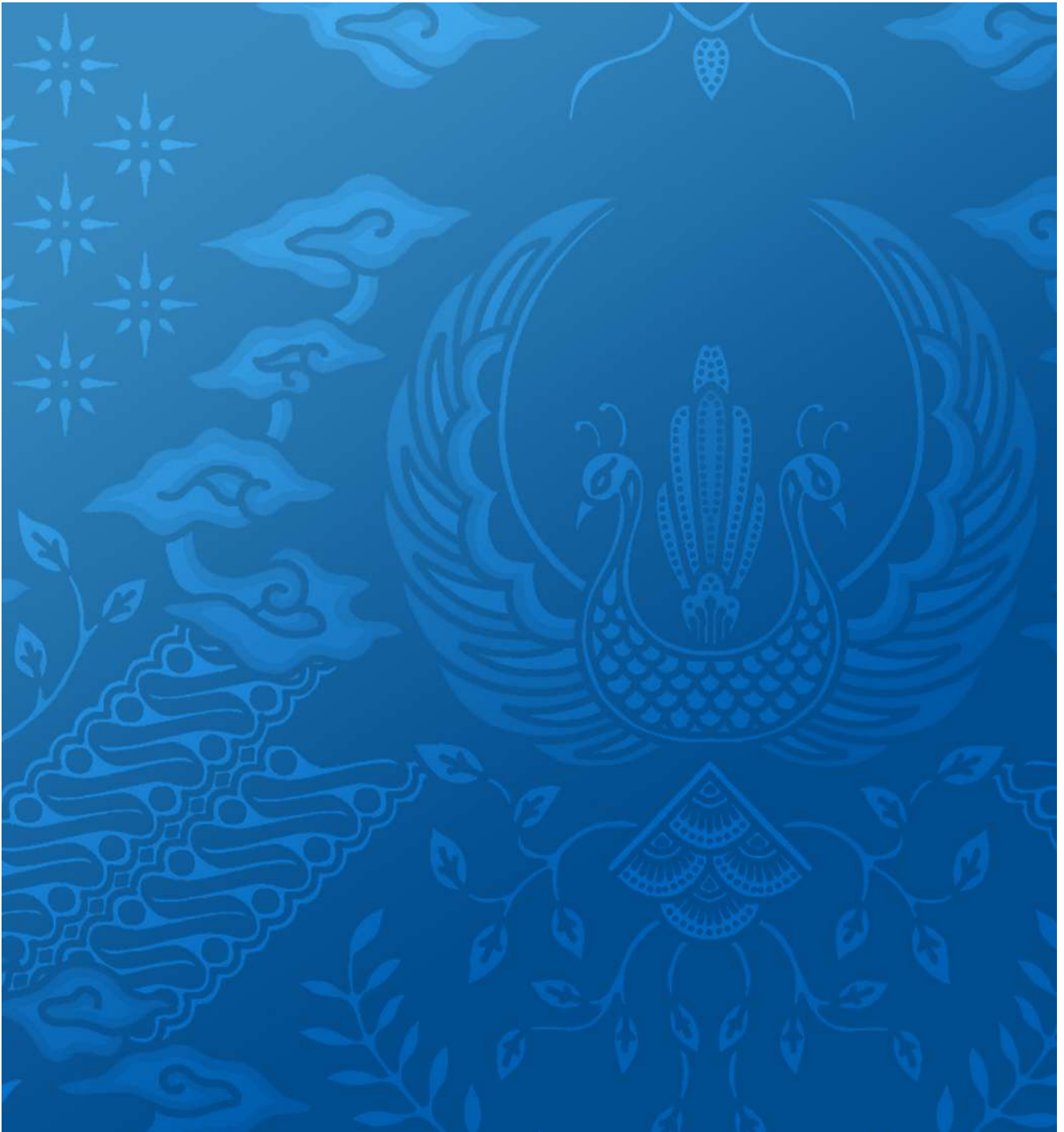

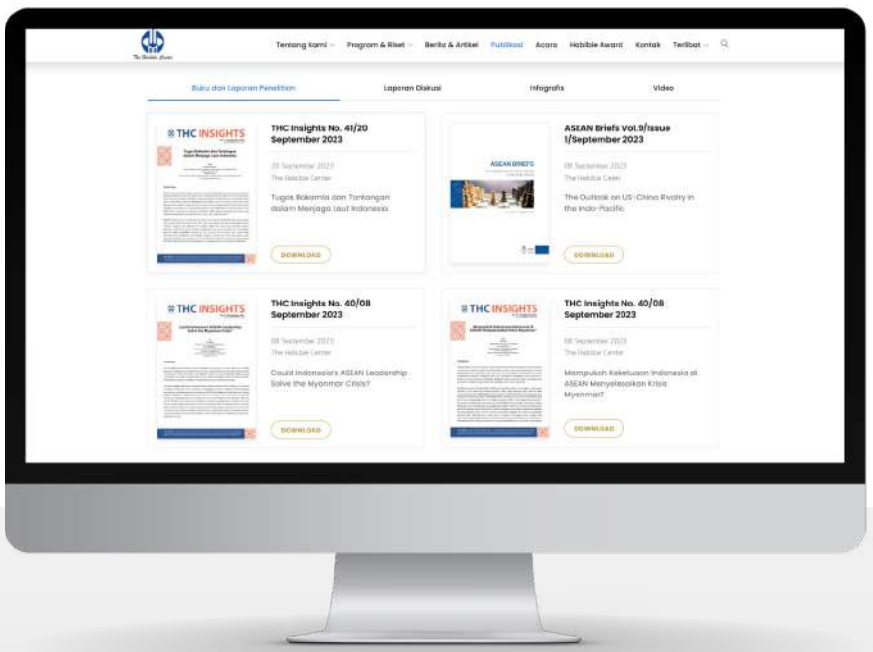
